## 500 R. G. and E. Employees Volunteer For War Emergency Service To Community



Small section of class in Air Raid Protection at the R. G. and E. Over 500 men are being trained to do specific tasks in the event of air raids. They will TURN ON your gas service after a raid. The customer is asked to SHUT OFF the gas providing bombs fall close enough to rattle windows violently or cause a distinct jar.

R. G. and E. employees are determined that their customers must be served, even though the war might come to Rochester, and vicinity and cause temporary interruption to our gas service.

Many of our factories making vital war materials use gas in their processing. In the home, eating establishments and institutions, gas is most essential for food preparation and for heating water, both of which are vital to health. For the sick and injured, large quantities of steaming hot water is required.

Realizing the importance of gas service to the public, 500 R. G. and E. employees are giving of their valuable time to undergo a strenuous training course to gain a full knowledge of every type of gas appliance, so that they can restore them to service after they have been shut off.

Thirty-two employees' homes scattered throughout the city and suburban areas have been set up as Emergency Headquarters from which a group of employees will work serving the customers in immediate vicinity.

The planned procedure to follow in case Rochester is bombed is as follows:

The AIR RAID PROTECTION TAG, which is being delivered to homes and is being tied to the gas shut off valve, bears this information: SHUT OFF GAS HERE if bombs are falling close enough to rattle the windows violently or cause you to feel a distinct jar, or, if gas pressure is low. Keep wrench handy at all times.

Immediately on the all-clear signal, employee volunteers will assemble at their assigned Emergency Headquarters and systematically contact every home within their district to restore service that has been shut off. People are urged to wait for these men to call. Every effort will be made to restore service as quickly as possible.
