INSTRUCTION FOR AIR RAID PROTECTION

Soon we shall tie a tag marked "AIR RAID PROTECTION" to the gas pipe at the main valve in your home. Be sure you know where this tag is located. Follow instructions on this tag in the event of an air raid. These instructions are as follows:

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1- Keep clear space in front of main gas valve at all times so that you can get to it easily
- 2-Keep a pipe wrench handy at all times.
- 3-IF BOMBS ARE FALLING CLOSE ENOUGH to RATTLE WINDOWS VIOLENTLY or CAUSE YOU TO FEEL A DISTINCT JAR or IF GAS PRESSURE IS LOW

Shut Off Gas at the main valve marked by an "AIR RAID PROTECTION" tag tied to gas pipe!

-WARNING- Do Not Turn On Gas!

In case the gas has been shut off, as outlined above, do not turn gas back on! W-A-I-T . . . for a member of the Rochester Gas and Electric Emergency Crew, who is working in your neighborhood. He will restore your service.

At our Main Offices, 89 East Ave., is an exhibit showing a typical gas pipe and valve installation similar to those in your own home. If you wish instructions in shutting off your gas meter we suggest that you come in and see this exhibit.

Something Special Coming Up

If you read Nevil Shute's "The Pied Piper," you don't need to have me tell you that it is one of the most unusual and effective stories that has come out of this war. The tale of an elderly Magician, trying desperately to get out of a Nazi-occupied France and hampered by several refugee children who have attached themselves to him on his travels. "The Pied Piper" made absorbing reading. I am willing to wager that it will make even more absorbing screen fare.

Naturally Johnson, whose screen play of "Grapes of Wrath" is still the best movie adaptation of a novel, serves in double capacity—as screenwriter and producer—as "Pied Piper," while Irving Pichel directs. In the title role you will see Monty Woolley, the Princeton professor, who stepped on to a Broadway stage in the musical comedy, "On Your Toes," and never returned to the classroom. He did a few movies after "On Your Toes" but for the past two years has been keeping busy playing the acidulous Sheridan Whitehead in "The Man Who Came to Dinner," both on stage and screen. Featured with Woolley in "Pied Piper" is Roddy McDowell, the most completely winning juvenile to have come to the screen in years, while charming Anne Baxter (you've seen her in "Swamp Water," "Charley's Aunt" and "The Great Profile"), has the role of a girl who assists "The Pied Piper" and his charges.

The big news about the picture, as far as Rochester is concerned, is that it is to receive a world premiere at the Palace Theater on July 16. And this will really be a Hollywood premiere with all the gala trimmings. That includes the presences of two of the stars—Woolley and Miss Baxter—along with Otto Preminger, who plays the Gestapo agent in the picture. It's a break for Rochester and a scoop for Jay Golden, who, in his short term as head of the RKO theaters, has done more than any other exhibitor to demonstrate the value of showmanship in regard to the merchandising of movies to the public.

The Prime Minister—A-1

One approaches "The Prime Minister" respectfully, sits through it dutifully and comes out of it with no more emotional reaction than one would feel as he left a moderately interesting history lecture. The picture, though it deals with Disraeli, is not a remake of George Arliss' early talkie, but it is difficult to watch John Gielgud's performance without making comparisons. Gielgud's ability and reputation demand respect but his Disraeli is inclined to be stodgy, lacking Arliss' polish and finesse. Diana Wynyard, however, gives a sincere and ingratiating performance and Will Fyfe has an excellent bit.
