## Cinema Comments

Cable to the American screen, but Mayo, although he has caught the atmosphere and some of the flavor that have distinguished Gabin's French movies, has emphasized atmosphere at the expense of drama. He keeps it straight narrative, never building drama even in sequences which feature Thomas Mitchell's outstanding characterization.

Gabin's performance does not seem to have all the force and depth that characterized his French portrayals, but Hollywood has not attempted to glamorize him, thank heaven, and we can assume that, as he becomes increasingly familiar with the new language, he will get back into his old stride. Ida Lupino is believable as the unhappy heroine, whose attempted suicide is thwarted by Gabin. With another director handling it, their romance might have been an idyllic love story in the "Man's Castle" - "Seventh Heaven" vein, but Mayo's unemotional direction keeps it merely the drab story of drab-people.

I don't know how the novel developed the character played by Claude Rains in the movie, but the picture makes him a vague, hardly-defined background figure. This lack of clear definition extends not only to most of the other characters, but to much of the motivation for the action. Archie Mayo has directed some good movies but this time his technique suggests rapid study of Durviller, Pagnol, John Ford, Hodge and others, but careful attention to none of them.

## Other Movies

It is said that there has never been a first-rate movie about baseball. "It Happened in Flatbush," A-1, which deals with the Brooklyn Dodgers, has come and gone and the statement still holds. Lloyd Nolan gives his usual unforced portrayal and the picture has its moments, but not enough of them to compensate for long stretches of dull, repetitious material.

An old William Powell-Rosalind Russell movie, "Rendezvous," A-1, has been brought up to date with Japs and Axis spies, given the more specific title of "Pacific Rendezvous" but serves only to lead out our contention that likable Leo Bowman is worthy of better things.

The Westerns of the week include a lively, but ordinary, second-rater, "In Old California," A-1, and a new Wallace Beery picture, "Jackass Mall," A-1. This opus is just "Min and Bill" stuff in a Western locale—with a touch of "The Champ" thrown in for good measure. Wallace Beery is Beery as usual, but Marjorie Main becomes, if anything, louder and less funny with each new movie role.

## Priest Aids Settling Major Labor Dispute

LOS ANGELES.—Adjustment of wages, hours and vacations and the signing of a new labor-management contract have resulted from the efforts of the Rev. Joseph A.

Vaughan, R.J., of Loyola University here, an arbitrator in a major labor dispute.

Father Vaughan, who is president of ethics at the university, was chosen as arbitrator in a dispute between the International Ladies' Garment Workers Union local and the Macy O'Day Corporation, said to be the largest dress goods factory in the area. After signing of the contract

both union and company asked Father Vaughan to continue as permanent impartial chairman in all future disputes but pressure of classroom work forced him to decline.

If we give our heart fully and unreservedly to God, we shall grow in holiness and perfection.

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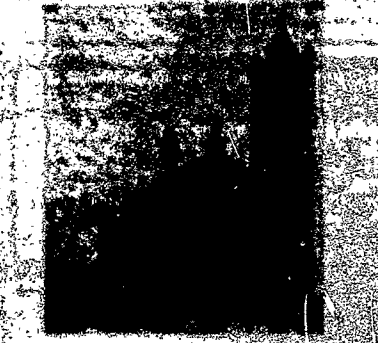
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
