

## Knights Present National Trophy To Auburn Squires

AUBURN—St. Alphonsus' Columbian Squires will be awarded the silver trophy which they won in competition with circles in the United States and Canada. Grand Knight George Shamon of Auburn Council, Knights of Columbus will present the trophy on Friday evening, July 24 in Recreation Hall to Chief Squire Joseph Falvey.

Grand Knight Shamon will be assisted by past Grand Knights Patrick Mullally, John Leo and Francis Cuddy and Councilors Joseph E. Heick and James Hickey and Chancellor George Payne.

In the Columbian Squires Herald published at New Haven, Conn. the achievement of the St. Alphonsus Circle of Auburn is described as follows: "Auburn wins the fourth annual Spring Contest. The St. Alphonsus Circle, New York State premier unit, scored a heavy total of contest points in all contest divisions and invested 34 new members in May to come home at the head of the spring parade. The Auburn Squires scored a total of 1,010 points in the Spring Contest." Many Achievements

St. Alphonsus' Unit is now nine years old. It has many accomplishments to its credit during this time. Under the direction of their pastor, Father Frederick G. Straub, Recreation Hall contains a fully equipped library which is used regularly by the Squires. This library was started as a small project to introduce the boys to the right kind of reading and has proved a real asset to the organization. The Columbian Squires also have a camp on the East Side of the Lake near Koenig's Point and the Camp now has a chapel dedi-

The Auburn Circle has been selected as a model for the Squire Program in all parishes in the United States and Canada. The Auburn Circle is ready to invest new members and aid in organizing new circles in the diocese of Rochester and in the diocese of Syracuse. Any boy of St. Alphonsus parish from 14-18 years of age may join the Circle. Most Rev. James E. Kearney approves of the Squires organization and urges the Knights of Columbus to interest themselves in it.

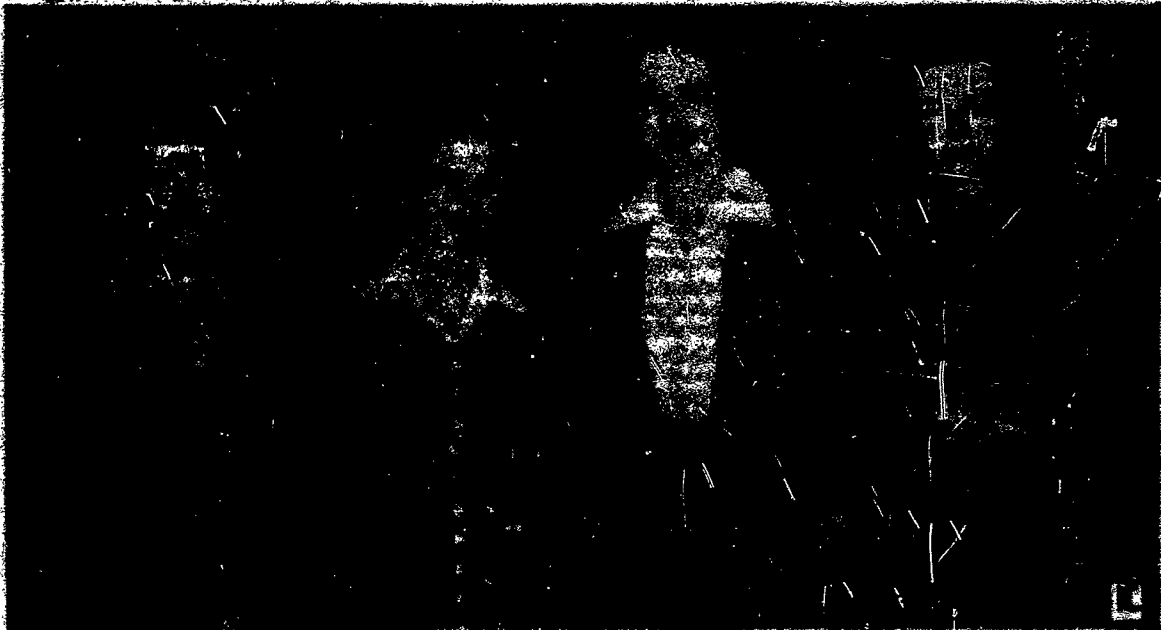
#### Jaros—Marko

The committal service in St. Joseph's Cemetery was in charge of Father Conrad Miller, St. Maurice Rice Post, American Legion, conducted military rites at the grave and Holdridge, Hunsdale and Edward J. Ramsay, past Rice Post and county commanders, Joseph Choney, past Rice Post commander, Herbert L. David, sergeant of the color guard and Hughie Charles Westover were among the delegation from the American Legion. Following the salute three valiant "Taps" were sounded by Hughie Westover.

At the conclusion of the service an American flag was presented to the mother of Chester Piotrowski, by Private James Kennedy of the U. S. Air Corps, who was assigned as a guard of honor to accompany the body of his late comrade to Auburn from Welch, West Virginia. The bearers were Julian Malick, John Mackay, John Kalkan, Howard Colman, Joseph Falat and George Stearns.
