SCHOOL BOARD OPPOSES GIVING SEVEN DAYS A YEAR TO RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION

WASHINGTON - Basing its objection on the fact that the program would result in seven days being taken out of the school time in the course of a year, the District of Columbia Board of Education has rejected a proposal to release public school children one hour a week to receive religious instruction in churches of their particular religions. The proposal was first made to the Board last April, and it was stipulated that the instruction would be for only those children whose parents requested it, and that all expenses would be borne by the respective churches.

The Board passed upon this proposal this week before recessing for the summer. The Board pointed to the fact that already, because of the employment of teachers and schools in selective service and rationing registration, the public school pupils are losing six days a year.
