According To The Doctor

EARLY SIGNS

What are the early signs of tuberculosis? That is a popular question that would draw an entirely different reply from the physician than it would from the average layman, says the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association. In all probability the physician would first ask you to restate the question. Do you mean the signs of early tuberculosis? or the early signs of advanced tuberculosis?

Paul de Kruif, noted writer on scientific subjects, aptly framed the reply in the following words: "Your tuberculosis is no longer early when you are already coughing, feverish, losing weight, sweating nights or spitting blood. It's early when you have no symptoms, but when the X-ray's nifty eye can detect its devilry in your lungs."

There is a nutshell in the entire story of the only way to combat the tubercle bacillus successfully. As Dr. Kruif indicates, the layman's interpretation of "early signs" is really a description of advanced tuberculosis.

Everyone of us should look for the true "early signs." The first way to do this is by having a tuberculin skin test. The skin test will never do you any harm and at the worst will not even cause as much discomfort as a mild reaction to small vaccination. It will, however, tell whether you have been in close contact with tuberculosis. Forty-eight hours after the injection the physician will read the result and tell you if it is positive or negative.

If it is positive lose no time in having a chest X-ray. This will reveal if you have active tuberculosis. If the skin test is negative, have it repeated at the suggestion of the physician. Another negative does not mean that you should forget tuberculosis in relation to yourself for evermore have skin tests annually.
