

# VEND Stresses Safety In War Industry

With the heavy loss of precious man-days of industrial labor by reason of accidents last year to men and women in industry, Verne A. Bird, Director of the Vocational Education for National Defense war industries training program, announced today "Plans are underway to place greater emphasis on safety and the elimination of causes for accidents in the training of new recruits for war plant jobs."

Mr. Bird explained that the greatest safety device is to train these potential war workers through knowledge, skill and proper attitude. Safety talks will become an important part of the VEND war industries training program.

Mr. Bird said, "It is hoped that workers absorbing the knowledge of developing their training for jobs from a safety standpoint will prove more successful on the job."

"The safe worker," Mr. Bird continued, "is very important in the battle of production. More man-days through the elimination of avoidable accidents will help greatly in stepped-up production."

All of VEND schools will receive a bulletin next week announcing the plans for a concerted drive in inserting a program of safety along with the regular industrial training program. The industrial safety program will become a permanent part of war jobs training Mr. Bird stated.

New machinery valued at \$6,200 was purchased for the local VEND program. The purchase was made possible by a new allocation of \$10,500 from the State Education Department, VEND Director Bird

## TRIDUUM SCHEDULED

Next Sunday, July 20, is the feast of St. Anne, the Mother of the Blessed Virgin Mary. To honor this great saint, a triduum will be held beginning Friday evening and closing on the feast Sunday evening. Special prayers to St. Anne and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament will make up the devotions each of the three evenings. There will also be a short sermon on Friday and Sunday nights and the Rosary on Saturday. The services will begin at 7:45. Confessions will be heard at the usual times on Saturday.

Because this triduum was not announced at the Masses on last Sunday, those who read this notice are asked to tell their friends and to invite others to these devotions in honor of St. Anne.

The scroll containing the names of service men in the parish was placed in the front vestibule of the Church last Sunday. Additional names have already been received and will be added as soon as possible. Shortly the scroll will be placed in the sanctuary before St.

Joseph's altar where it may serve as a reminder to all to offer prayers to St. Joseph for the protection of these soldiers.

# College Students Now Eligible To Win U. S. Marine Commissions

WASHINGTON, D. C. — College students who have graduated from school and are now under 30 years of age and men now in college who will be under 27 years old at the time of graduation are eligible for a lieutenant's commission in the U. S. Marine Corps Reserve, it was pointed out in a statement issued at Marine headquarters here today.

"As the most versatile fighting force in the world, the Marine Corps needs junior officers," Brig. Gen. Robert L. Denig, Director of the Division of Public Relations of the Marine Corps, pointed out in an address made recently in Dallas, Texas.

Speaking before the "War Work" conference of the National Junior Board of Commerce, General Denig said, "There is rapid expansion taking place in the Corps that requires young men with good backgrounds who can, after proper training, become leaders."

"In order to become a Marine officer, a ten-week course of instruction, known as the Candidates' Class for commission precedes appointment as second lieutenant. To qualify for Candidates' class you must be between 20 and 30 years of age and a graduate of an accredited college or university.

If you are attending college now, you are eligible providing you will be able to graduate with a degree and complete the Candidates' class before you are 27," General Denig said.

During the intensive ten weeks' instruction period at Quantico, Va., at the Marine Base there, college men will be paid \$54 a month and hold the rank of private first class in the Marine Corps. As second lieutenants in the Marine Corps their monthly pay with allowance will be \$216.

Graduates of accredited colleges and universities who hold degrees in one of the following are eligible now for admission to the Candidates' Class: Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Commercial Science, Bachelor of Journalism, Bachelor of Forestry, Bachelor of Agriculture, Bachelor of Industrial Arts, Bachelor of Education, Bachelor of Philosophy, Bachelor of Business Administration, Bachelor of Law (if preceded by two years' academic study) and any engineering degree.
