According To The Doctor

We seldom hear of a child dying of tuberculosis, but that is no criterion as to the ease with which he may become infected, says the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association. Tuberculosis behaves like two separate diseases. The first time the germ gets into the body, usually from a person with an active case, the infection frequently runs a fairly harmless course. The child may never be conscious of having any illness and apparently complete healing occurs in over 10 per cent of the cases.

That healing, however, is not as complete as it seems. Under a variety of circumstances, a breaking down of the old spot may occur and this time the second infection, the adult form, is far from harmless. This breaking down, however, cannot occur unless a person already has had the first type.

The tuberculin test will detect simply and harmlessly if the child has any infection. If the result is positive, an X-ray of the chest becomes necessary to determine the type and extent of the trouble. Children who react to the tuberculin should be given periodic X-rays, even though the first revealed no tuberculosis. Those who were negative should be given tuberculin tests with each physical examination.

In each case of reaction to tuberculin a thorough checkup is advisable to determine the cause of the infection. Sometimes it is a parent, a relative, a domestic or even a school teacher who may have been the source of the primary infection. And that same individual, if the contact is not broken, may be the cause of the second infection.

Where the second infection is attributable to a breakdown, rather than to a repeated contact with the tuberculous, we may usually look for inadequate diet or over-exertion as the mal factors. Sometimes, however, a non-tuberculous infection such as measles or severe sore throat may be the cause.

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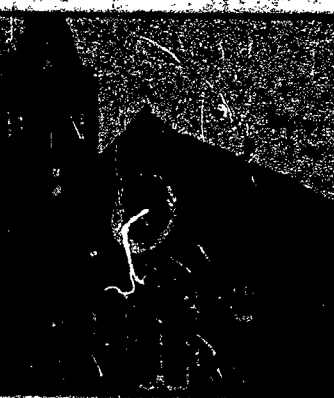

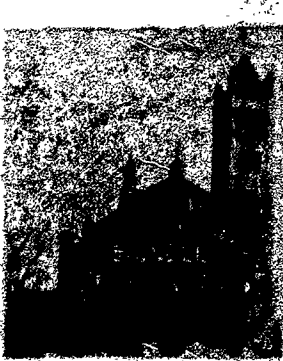
