This outile said that all Catholic organi-zations had been prohibited by the Nazi conquerers and their holdings espropriated The Catholic Work-ers' Union, which has membership of 200,060, and the Catholic Farmers' Union, with 100,000 members, both lost all their buildings, in-cluding the libraries they maintained.

To those unions, and similar or-ganizations, Dr. Kasteel gave a great deal of credit for the staunch resistance to Nazi principles on the part of Catholics. They both main tained strong Catholic newspan and continually strove to their members in Catholic Sprinel-

**Catholic Sanatorium** Seized By Nazi Troops

LONDON A tuberculosis sanstorium in Holland, named for Monsignor Mutsaersoord, which was the property of the Catholic trade union of railway workers, has been seized by the Nazi invaders and converted into quarters for German airmen, according to in-formation received here.

More than a hundred of the patients, it was stated, were left unattended until provision could be made to transfer them to a nearby home, and all of the furnishing, were either sold publicly or used to equip a new home for Mari youths.
