Quatrano Named To Direct Neighborhood House

Well-deserved recognition of his work and talents has been accorded Allie P. Quatrano of 114 E. Fifth St. by appointment as acting director of the Neighborhood House.

Mr. Quatrano's appointment was announced by the N.H. Board of directors and becomes effective Sept. 1. He will succeed Elmer L. Ficht who has resigned to take a position in Paterson, N. J.

By dint of hard work and perseverance for many years in his chosen field of endeavor, Mr. Quatrano is well-equipped to assume the responsibilities of his new position. He has come to be widely known throughout the Southern Tier for his work among boys and has achieved the respect and admiration of his fellow citizens. Last year a committee of prominent citizens selected him as "the most outstanding young Elmira man of 1941" and he was presented the Junior Association of Commerce Distinguished Service Award.

Mr. Quatrano has lived in Elmira since he was 7, coming to this country from Naples, Italy. As a boy he lived near the Neighborhood House and entered into its activities. He graduated from St. Anthony's Parish and the Southside High School. In 1930 he received a bachelor's degree in physical education from the American College of Physical Education in Chicago. He has supplemented his education with summer courses at Springfield College, University of Notre Dame, New York University, Long Island University and Cortland Normal. He is now studying for his Master's degree at New York University.

He has been scoutmaster of the Neighborhood House troop for 12 years. He is also a Red Cross first aid instructor.

Mr. Quatrano has been especially active in the affairs of St. Anthony's parish and has conducted a course in physical education for the children of the parochial school for the past two years. He has also acted as Catholic Courier correspondent for St. Anthony's.

Discipline or Degeneration Warns Priest On Radio

NEW YORK (NC)—Experience proves that when in the matter of culture the will is not used for the purpose of controlling, curbing and keeping in harmony soul and body mental and racial degeneration result. The Rev. Vincent Lloyd-Russell, pastor of Our Lady Help of Christians Church, Los Angeles, declared in the "Catholic Hour" Sunday night.

Declaring that "unlike the brute creation, which in activity is directed by instinct man is endowed with will," Father Lloyd-Russell said when a race "abandons restraint in any of its cultural institutions, such as education for example," racial degeneration will follow.

"It is the part of Christianity," he declared, "to invoke discipline as a means of assisting man, a creature of body and soul, to arrive not only at earthly happiness but at beatitude before the throne of God. The discipline of the body therefore, is a part of the Christian way of living."

He added that "Catholicism declares discipline a necessity for the full perfection of man, and in cer-

tain things of discipline, it will make no compromise because they are essential things."

"Here arises another difficulty of the Catholic life," he said. "It is hard and at times—exceedingly bitter for the body and for the mind to submit to rigorous conformity, but this is exactly what is demanded in the realm of essential doctrine and morality."

Catholic Teachers In National Meet

HAVANA—The National Federation of Cuban Catholic Teachers will hold its third national assembly at Pinar del Rio, Aug. 14 to 16. The Catholic education system and the contribution of Catholic teachers to the progress of pedagogy will be the principal topics of discussion.

This year marks the 100th anniversary of the opening of the law school in St. Louis university, first institute for legal training in the United States under Catholic auspices.

Victory Housing Unit Named For Priest

CHICAGO—A new victory housing development of 108 homes, to be started soon on Chicago's South Side, will be named for a Catholic priest who was not only spiritual leader to his own parish, St. Gabriel's, but friend and adviser to scores of Chicago's working men and women.

He is the late Rev. Maurice J. Dorney, pastor for more than 30 years of St. Gabriel's Church in the heart of the stockyards district. The Maurice J. Dorney Homes, to be built at a cost of \$248,000, will be open only to war workers and their families with incomes below \$2,100 annually.
