

Community Leadership Urged On Rural Pastor

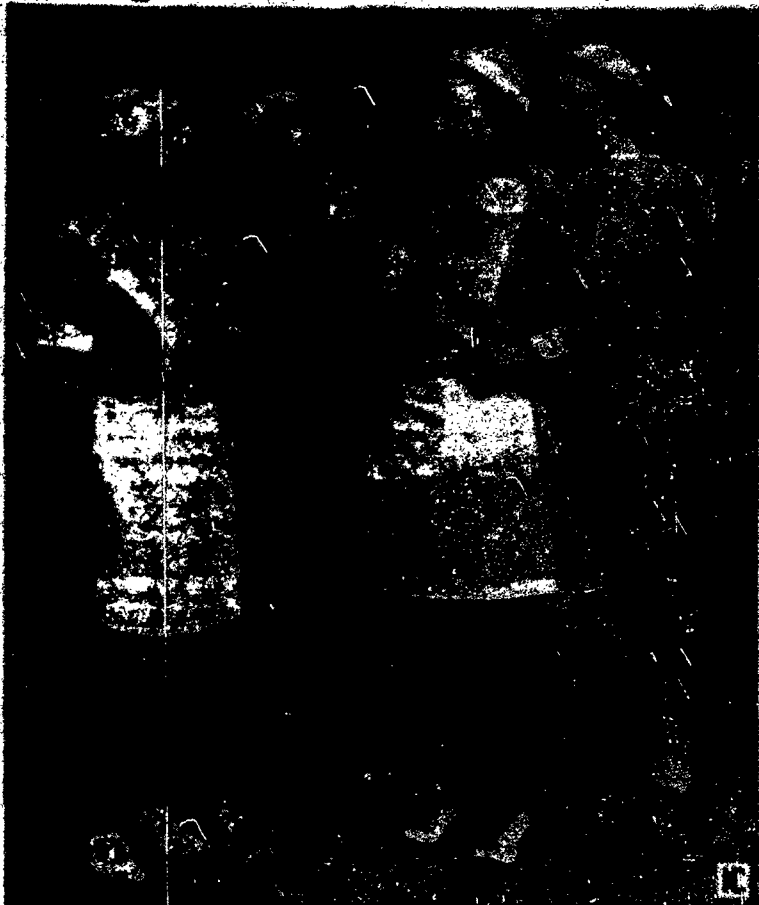
ST. LOUIS. The value of active leadership on the part of rural pastors not merely in parish life but in the life of the whole community was stressed by two priests at the Rural Life Institute held at St. Louis University under the auspices of the National Catholic Rural Life Conference.

The Rev. George Nell, pastor of St. Joseph's Church, Effingham, Ill., said that when he assumed his pastorate the rural congregation was in such a financial condition that the people could afford nothing but the bare necessities of a low standard of living.

Community discussions in which Father Nell took an active part led to practical programs for improvement and the area is now one of the best livestock producing communities in the State, he said. Father Nell has won national recognition for his organization of cooperatives in his rural parish.

Pastors can assume leadership in bringing the benefits of existing agencies to their rural communities, it was stressed by the Rev. George J. Hildner, pastor of St. John's Church, Gildersham, Mo. Delegates to the institute were guests of Father Hildner at his model rural parish.

Just as our allies are looking to us for aid and help to win this present war, so, I am sure, the present reigning Pontiff is looking to the Catholic manhood of America to protect the Church and her ideals here."

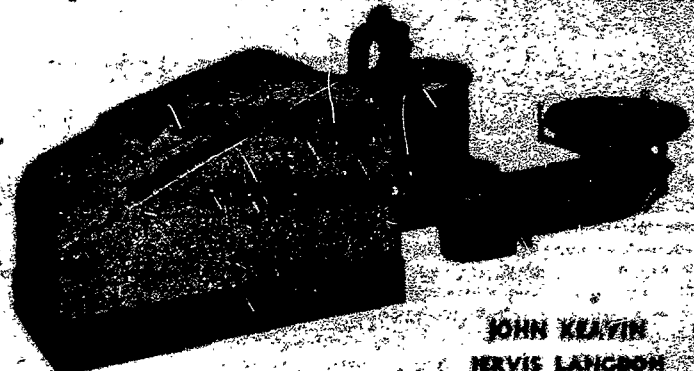
