Prayerbook He Read On Raft After Torpedoing At Sea Soldier's Prized Possession

CINCINNATI — A prayerbook, soaked with the salt spray of the Atlantic Ocean, is the most prized possession of Corporal Richard Glasmeier, Cincinnati youth who was rescued from a raft 73 miles off the New England coast after the ship on which he was returning from Ireland was torpedoed by an Axis submarine.

Corporal Glasmeier, visiting his home here, told how he read the prayerbook over and over as the waves buffeted the life raft on which he and another soldier, Richard Bock, clung. He told also how he had noticed a Bible in the overcoat pocket of his companion and discovered that he, too, was a Catholic. Corporal Glasmeier's prayerbook had been a gift from a Catholic chaplain at an army camp in Texas.

Together, he said, the two recited the prayers "for all we were worth" until a navy patrol boat picked them up after 18 hours on the raft.

Corporal Glasmeier has gone to an officers' school. He attended St. Francis de Sales School and Purcell High School here before entering the service.

Vacation Hints

With rationing of gas, shortage of tires, reduction of railroad travel, it looks as if many people will spend their vacations at home this summer. Nevertheless, here are a few simple rules to remember if you start on your vacation, or a weekend or an outing.

- 1. If driving, keep under 40 miles an hour. It saves gas and rubber. These are vital war materials.
2. Complete all details early and obtain plenty of rest the night before leaving.
3. Swim and dive only in safe waters and always with someone else. Wait at least two hours after eating before going into the water.
4. Take your sun baths gradually, until your skin gets used to the sun. Remember the safe tolerance to exposure to the sun is not the same for all individuals.
5. Exercise moderately, dress lightly, and eat wisely.
6. Boil water if it is not known to be absolutely pure, before drinking it.
7. Learn to recognize poison ivy, poison sumac, avoid them. After exposure to either wash thoroughly with strong soap and water.
