

ST. HYACINTH'S, Auburn

PASTOR REAPPOINTED

AUBURN - Rev. Jerome Holobosiez, O.M.C., has been reappointed pastor of St. Hyacinth's Church in Pulaski Street, here, where he has served in that capacity for the past fifteen years. Rev. Vincent Walsh, O.M.C., who has been assigned pastor at St. Hyacinth's for the past six years has also been returned and has been elected superior of the fathers for the next three years.

Father Jerome returned Sunday from St. Hyacinth's Seminary, Cranby, Mass., where he attended the 15th Provincial Chapter of St. Anthony's Province. The electorate body was composed of 46 priests and in the group was Father Jerome, who was also elected to the guardianship of the St. Bonaventure Custody which embraces the Houses and Convents in ten cities.

A Provincial holds office for three years in the Franciscan Order, minor convents, from which the priests at St. Hyacinth's Church are named. The Very Rev. Lawrence Cynan, O.M.C. of Chicopee, Mass. was unanimously re-elected to the office of Provincial.

St. Anthony's Province was divided three years ago at the last elections, into the Eastern Province of St. Anthony and the Western Province of St. Bonaventure with headquarters at St. Joseph's Basilica, Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

The Eastern Province at present consists of 176 ordained priests, a large number of Seminarians and Lay Brothers and has a total of 337 members including Novices and college boys. The Very Rev. Provincial has under his jurisdiction, 38 Convents and Houses; 29 Parishes, 4 Missions and Stations, two Chaplaincies, one Seminary, one Novitiate and one College. The territory takes in all east from the Michigan State line running south and Canada on the North.

Auburnians are pleased that Father Jerome will remain in Auburn. He has accomplished a great deal since coming to the city, having improved and added to the church property. He has been responsible for the construction of a new Convent and School, and has improved the Church and added more grounds to the church property in Pulaski and Union Streets. St. Hyacinth's are fortunate, indeed, to have both Father Jerome and Father Vincent with them during the coming years.

FIRE SWEEPS CENTURY-OLD SOUTHERN PARISH CHURCH

PAULDING, Miss. - St. Michael's Church, almost a century old and the fourth oldest parish church in Mississippi, was destroyed by fire when struck by lightning. The adjoining rectory also was destroyed, as were all the church records.

The church was erected in 1840 by a group of Catholic settlers under the Rev. G. J. Boheme and the first Mass was celebrated on Christmas of that year.

Paulding now has a total population of 200, but St. Michael's parish has given 30 Sisters and one Brother to various communities.
