You have surely been thrilled at the accounts of our Conferences on A Call to Service, as given in our diocesan paper, the CATHOLIC COURIER, and in our secular papers.

An article on the four conferences in Geneva, Rochester, Auburn and Elmira will appear in the August number of Catholic Action. It has been written by Miss Irma Pieybo of the N.C.C.W., one of the speakers at the Conferences. It will well repay your reading.

Our need for tin is one of the most critical needs throughout the nation at the present time. The primary reason for the tin shortage is owing to the fact that the Japanese now control the area from which the world annually received 60% of its tin. The only other world sources of tin are from Bolivia, South America, and Africa, from which the problem of shipping facilities has become most difficult. Therefore the only means available to secure tin is through the salvage program.

Rochester has been chosen as one of 22 metropolitan selected areas in which the War Production Board is sponsoring a Prepared Tin Salvage Program.

As the women in the household have the closest contact in the use of tin cans, the women in the community have been asked to assist in this movement.

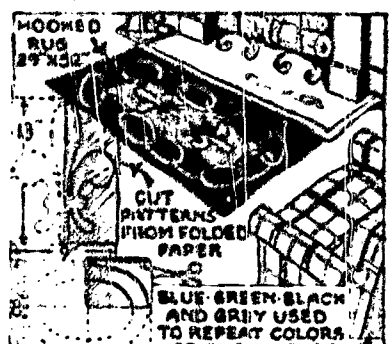

A Link of Friendship Rug This is the third design in the series planned to use up odds and ends of woolen materials to make lasting floor coverings. The de-



sign is very old and was made by other women during other wars. Dimensions are given in the sketch for making your own patterns for the links and the fleur de lis. The shaded parts of the diagrams show a half and a quarter of the design drawn on folded paper. The dotted lines show how the pattern will appear when the paper has been cut. The design is outlined on the burlap by drawing around the cut-out pattern with wax crayon. The rug colorings have been planned to repeat tones in the room color schemes.

Note: There are suggestions for preparing hooked rug materials and for making original designs in BOOK 5 of the series which Mrs. Ruth Wyeth Spears has prepared for readers. Book 6 contains directions for a hooked rug that any beginner can make easily and quickly. Booklets are 10c each.
