

Cadet Drum Corps Hailed For Turn-outs In Corning

CORNING—One organization in the City of Corning, made up of boys from St. Patrick's Parochial School, that has achieved an enviable reputation for its performance in various civic affairs, is the St. Patrick's Cadets' Drum and Bugle Corps.

Established more than 25 years ago by the Rev. Walter J. Leo, then pastor at St. Patrick's, the Cadets began to come to the notice of the public only about 7 years ago when under the direction of the Rev. Bernard Newcomb, assistant pastor at that time and now of Auburn, they took up music and drilling. Eventually uniforms were provided for them and it was not long before they began to make an excellent showing at various public and parish affairs. Their leader then was Francis C. Hoffman, now deceased.

Today the Cadets, who are now under the direction of Earl Breen, band instructor at Corning Free Academy, are constantly being invited to take part in some civic function. They have provided music several times when the draft contingents have been leaving. They have performed admirably at graduation exercises for air raid wardens and auxiliary firemen and have appeared in numerous parades. Needless to say they are a heart warming and morale building sight as they swing along in their smart uniforms of white trousers with green capes and matching berets. Their pastor, the Rev. E. A. Rawlinson, and their present leader, Clarence Ferraro, have every reason to be proud of them.

The membership of the Cadets is constantly shifting. Father Rawlinson said, due, for one reason, to the fact that boys are taken away by graduation each year and only a few high school boys continue in the organization. Another cause is that sometimes families move out of the parish. However, there are usually from 25 to 40 boys enrolled and active.

Besides their music and drill practice the boys often meet in the Parish Hall for games, boxing and also to learn how to work with their hands. They have made a number of model airplanes. The boys are in charge of the Rev. William T. Tobin, assistant pastor, who succeeds the Rev. Thomas Kane, recently transferred to Rhaca.

O'Donovan Memorial as a tribute to a great benefactor of Catholic education.

GOOD OLD SOL

Jackie and Johnnie and Sister Susie are minded to do summer time up brown. They certainly do, all right, sometimes. The first breath of hot weather and sunshine finds them soaking up the sun's rays at a rate that would broil a quick steak quick.

Their skin gets red and then begins to hurt, then to peel, and then - be careful. Some careless lads and lassies have munched right out into the sunshine again, determined to get their coat of tan just as quickly as the first peeling wears off. And some of them wind up in a hospital with limbs and muscles damaged, badly damaged for life. Fearful sun is bright, but takes it easy. You can get enough in easy little doses, five or ten minutes a day, and get it safely. Longer exposure is bound to react painfully and harshly until the system gets used to it and the skin is stuned to the penetrating heat the summer sun gives off.

Swimming is a great sport but when drops of water remain on the skin, they form little magnifying crystals for the sun's rays, increasing the burn and accelerating the depth of it.

Wet burn, too, can be a vexatious thing.

So take it easy. Get all the outdoor air and summer sun that you can, but get it sensibly. Nature does things slowly but surely. A little at a time then and you will enjoy the better and the longer, these days of health.
