SODALITY COMMUNION DAY

AUBURN—Next Sunday is the Communion Day of the Sodality of Mary and all the young women of St. Mary's Parish. The Sodalists are asked to remember that the general Mass intention for the month of August is for the sick and unemployed. The Defense Program for the Sodality is the Daily Mass for Peace.

In discussing this phase of Sodality Life the Central Office at St. Louis, Missouri sends the following reasons for Daily Mass: (1) Surely every Sodalist realizes that prayer will bring peace, but your prayers must be constant and untiring. You must make God realize that you are in earnest and that you know that it is only He who can bring peace to the world. (2) In spite of the realization and the fact that the spirit is at times willing to be persevering in attendance at daily Mass, you grow tired and lax in your intentions. It is therefore extremely important to be given the personal encouragement of your society, the Sodality, reminders, motivation, and the pride in corporate achievement can induce, even some of those who are the weakest to attend Mass daily, offering this great sacrifice for peace.

The members of the Sodality are also asked to remember in their prayers the Seminar Schools of Catholic Action which are being held during August and to pray in

particular that the faculty may be guided to teach those things which are of most vital importance to the Church, that the students may be receptive to the teaching and that the war will not interfere with attendance at the schools, nor the safety of those who attend.

Did you know that: Rev. John Lane of Texas, a graduate of St. Mary's Parochial School spent the week-end in Auburn and offered Mass at St. Mary's Church on Sunday morning.

That: Rev. Albinus Lesch, C.P., formerly Raymond Lesch, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank J. Lesch of Auburn, also a graduate of St. Mary's School and a member of the same Class as Father Lane, has been appointed counsellor to the Seminarians in Baltimore, Md. Father Albinus was ordained last May as a member of the Passionist Congregation.

That: the chief chaplain of the United States Army, Rev. William R. Arnold, was once a pupil of Rev. Dr. William E. Cowen, Father Arnold studied for the priesthood at St. Bernard's Seminary in Rochester and was ordained in 1908. He was graduated in 1924 from the higher Chaplain School at Fort Wayne, Michigan, the highest in his class; received the rank of Colonel in 1937 and the rank of Brigadier General in 1942. The Church has also honored him with the title of Monsignor.

PARISHIONERS EDIT PAPER FOR BOYS IN SERVICE

AUBURN—St. Alphonsus parishioners, under the direction of their pastor, Father Frederick G.
