

### Study Miracles of Mother Cabrini

VATICAN CITY.—This morning the Cardinals and Coadjutors of the Sacred Congregation of Rites met for the second time to discuss the miracles proposed in the Cause of Canonization for Blessed Mother Cabrini, who died in Chicago in 1917 and was beatified in 1938.

Among those attending the meet-

ing were Their Eminences Carlo Cardinal Salotti, Prefect of the Congregation of Rites, Granito Cardinal Pignatelli di Belmonte, Dean of the Sacred College of Cardinals, Federico Cardinal Tedeschini, Eremegildo Cardinal Pellegrinetti, and Alessandro Cardinal Verde, Rector of the Cause.

The two miracles considered by the Congregation occurred in 1899 in the Diocese of Lodi, Italy, where Blessed Mother Cabrini was born. The meeting lasted two hours and its conclusions will be submitted for the approbation of His Holiness Pope Pius XII, after which a third meeting will be held in the presence of the Sovereign Pontiff.

GENEVA.—About 4000 patrons attended the annual mid-summer lawn social of St. Francis de Sales parish which was held on Wednesday afternoon and evening, July 22. Despite the rain which fell about 10 o'clock the event was termed highly successful.

### Honor Geneva Doctors Going Into Navy

GENEVA.—Forty-five members of the medical and dental professions of Geneva and surrounding communities gathered for a testimonial dinner at Belmont Club in honor of Lieut.-Commander Bernard S. Putney, USNR, and Lieut.-Commander Robert E. Doran, naval physicians, who recently received their commissions in the United States Navy. Dr. Putney is a member of St. Stephen's parish.

Dinner was served at 6:30 o'clock with Attorney Nicholas V. Midey acting as toastmaster. The event was one of the largest gatherings of its kind to be held here in some time.

Speakers on the program included Capt. C. W. Carr, USN, who will be surgeon in charge of the new Naval Hospital which will be built for the sailors at the Sampson Naval Training Station; Dr. M. E. Douel, president of the Ontario County Medical Society; Dr. Charles McCaffery, president of the Geneva Dental Society; Dr. Philip Skinner, president of the Medical staff of Geneva General Hospital; Dr. Edward Welberry of Waterloo, president of Geneva Academy of Medicine; Dr. James S. Allen, chairman of local Preparedness Committee, and Dr. C. C. Whiting, president-elect of the Geneva Academy of Medicine.

Dr. S. J. Morabito was chairman of the committee on arrangements for the dinner.

Dr. Putney and Dr. Doran were presented traveling bags by the groups, the presentation being made by Dr. Morabito.

A highlight of the program was the address by Captain Carr who arrived in Geneva a short time ago preparatory to taking over his new duties. Captain Carr has been a surgeon in the United States Navy for a period of 23 years.

He spoke on the work that will be accomplished at the Training Station after it is in operation, and lauded the two Geneva doctors who are to leave soon to take up their new duties in the United States Navy.

Dr. Putney, eye, ear, nose and throat specialist, is a graduate from St. Mark's Academy, Ogdensburg, N. Y., in 1921, graduate of the University of Notre Dame, pre-medical in 1925, graduate from McGill University, Doctor of Medicine in 1929; served internship at St. Joseph's Hospital, South Bend, Ind., from 1929 to 1930; medical residency at Dixmont Hospital, Pittsburgh, Pa., from 1930-34; surgeon at Brooklyn Eye, Ear and Nose Hospital from 1934 to 1935; passed National Board examination in 1930 and became a member of the American Board of Otolaryngology in 1941.

Dr. Doran was graduated from Hobart College in 1922 and Syracuse University, College of Medicine in 1929; served internship in Jersey City Hospital from 1928 to 1929; resident orthopedic surgeon 1928 to 1930; and resident surgeon 1930 to 1932. He was elected a fellow at the American College of Surgeons in 1935.

### Named First Woman City Clerk

GENEVA.—Appointment of Mrs. Anna L. Leamy of 15 Goodelle Terrace, to be acting city clerk during the Army service of Attorney George F. Davis has been announced by Mayor Charles F. Nieder. Mrs. Leamy will be the first woman to act as city clerk, although the Deputy City Clerk, Miss Elizabeth Lydon, has occasionally been called upon to serve in that capacity during the absence of illness of regular clerks.

Mrs. Leamy, wife of J. J. Leamy, local railroad employe, has been active in Democratic politics here for a number of years. She has served as a member of the election

board, and is now a member of the city Board of Health. As health commissioner is not a salaried post, it is believed the ruling that no city official can serve in two offices will not make it necessary for her to resign from the board.

Among the duties of the city clerk are those of recording and keeping the minutes of the Common Council and Mrs. Leamy will act regularly as Council clerk. The council also has one woman member, Mrs. Bertha J. Mancy, alderman from the Fifth Ward.

Mrs. Leamy, Miss Lydon and Mrs. Mancy are members of St. Francis de Sales parish.

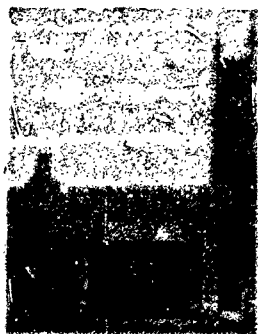
