Plot of the play presented by campers and counsellors at Camp Columbus on July 24 is as follows:

In 1492 Columbus sailed the ocean blue and arrived on the banks of Lake Ontario there to establish the Camp which bears his name. After the discovery of Camp Columbus, the great explorer returned to Spain and found the royal court in a frenzy of dismay. The royal family had been affronted. The bridegroom of Princess Catherine had been slain as the wedding procession was approaching the altar in the Cathedral of Madrid.

The news spread that the assassin had fled to America. Upon the request of the Princess, King Ferdinand, Columbus, and the entire court embarked for the New World to bring the criminal to justice. On their arrival His Majesty's Court held session. The king was grief-stricken when, following the testimony of Columbus' stepbrother, it seemed certain that Columbus was the murderer — the motive, his secret love for Catherine.

Protesting his innocence, Columbus was being led to the gallows, when the Indian Princess, Pocahontas, entered the court room and brought forth proof that the stepbrother himself had done the evil deed. The culprit was hanged forthwith. The king returned to Spain where Columbus was received into the royal family through his marriage to Princess Catherine. Such were the events portrayed in *Murder at Court* or *Spanish Treachery*, a drama presented by the Camp Columbus Summer Theatre.

Since the Camp traces its origin to Columbus, it has retained its Spanish traditions. The cabins for example are named for famous figures of Spanish history. The six cabins are: Ferdinand, Isabella, Santa Maria, Pinta, Nina, and Port o' Spain. All the dishes at meals are seasoned with Spanish onions, and a favorite dish with all the campers is Spanish rice. A Camp Columbus Counselor would not be seen smoking anything but a Spanish cigar. Yes, as we write this we are studiously munching on Spanish peanuts.

Reveille is sounded at 7:00 A. M. The boys attend dialogue Mass at 7:30 following which there is the flag raising ceremony and breakfast. At 9:15 the dishes have been washed and the cabins are ready for inspection. The C. D. makes the rounds inspecting the cabins on these points: Floors, beds, entrance, personal shelves, and conduct. After the inspection there are two ball games, one in the senior league and one in the junior league, craft work and interest groups. At 11:00 swim period begins and extends to 11:45. At 12:00 the Angelus is rung in the Queen of Peace Chapel; the Angelus is followed by dinner. After dinner comes rest period until 2:15 followed by store

and ball game, craft, and swimming instructions. The second swim period begins at 4:00 P. M. and continues to 5:15. At 5:30 the Rosary is recited in the Chapel and the Angelus is said. Supper follows immediately. In the evening, store reopens after which there is some entertainment (e. g. camp fire, play, boxing, etc.). The day comes to an end with night prayers in the Chapel.

The high-light of each week's encampment is an over-night canoe-bike. Last week the members of the Nina, high scoring cabin on inspection, paddled five miles to Willow Point on the southwesterly side of the Lake. There they supped, slept, and breakfasted. The nearby ghost town of Ennsore lent a note of adventure and romance to the over-night stay.

The water-front at Camp Columbus is one of the unusually fine features of the Camp; it is authoritatively opined that it is one of the best in the state. It consists of a 200 foot pier, a stationary raft, and a 16 ft. by 12 ft. floating raft complete with diving board. Each of these rafts is fitted with an observation tower where a guard is posted at every swim. In addition to this there are two row boats, two 25 foot war canoes, one smaller canoe, and a comet class sail boat. An effective checking system is rigorously enforced to insure water-front safety. Two more of the Camp personnel, Ed Zimmer and Chuck Bennett, received their senior life-guard insignia last week.

Summer activities are now being arranged and include a trip to Cobourg on July 26; the annual picnic August 9 and a camping trip during the weeks of August 16 to 30.

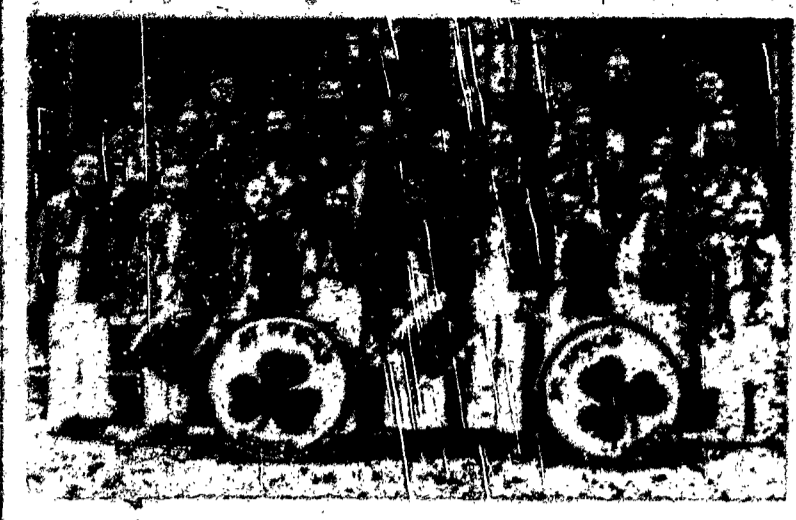
