Bishop's Relief Committee  
Sends Religious Articles  
To U. S. Prisoners In Japan

NEW YORK.—Five shipments of religious articles for the use of American prisoners of war held by the Japanese have been forwarded by the Chaplains' Aid Association from its headquarters here.

Each of these shipments, which were financed by the Bishops' Relief Committee of the N. C. W. C., consisted of a Mass kit, 500 prayerbooks, 500 rosaries, 200 new testaments, 1,000 medals and hundreds of small crucifixes, scapulars, statuettes, plaques, leaflets and pamphlets. The Bishops' Relief Committee also recently allocated the sum of \$50,000 for American Prisoners of War in Japan to be administered through the Holy See and its representative in Japan.

The shipment of 2,500 Rosaries exhausted the supply of the Chaplains' Aid Association and the directors are looking to private sources for these and other articles of devotion. Imports of Rosaries from abroad have almost stopped and local manufacture is curtailed by war priorities, so practically the only sources of supply are the parish church and the Catholic families that forward to the Chaplains' Aid Association used or broken Rosaries which can be reconditioned.

Since last December several thousand Rosaries have been reconditioned by local chapters of Chaplains' Aid and by the central office. These are forwarded to chaplains as requests come to headquarters at 10 East 52nd Street, this city.

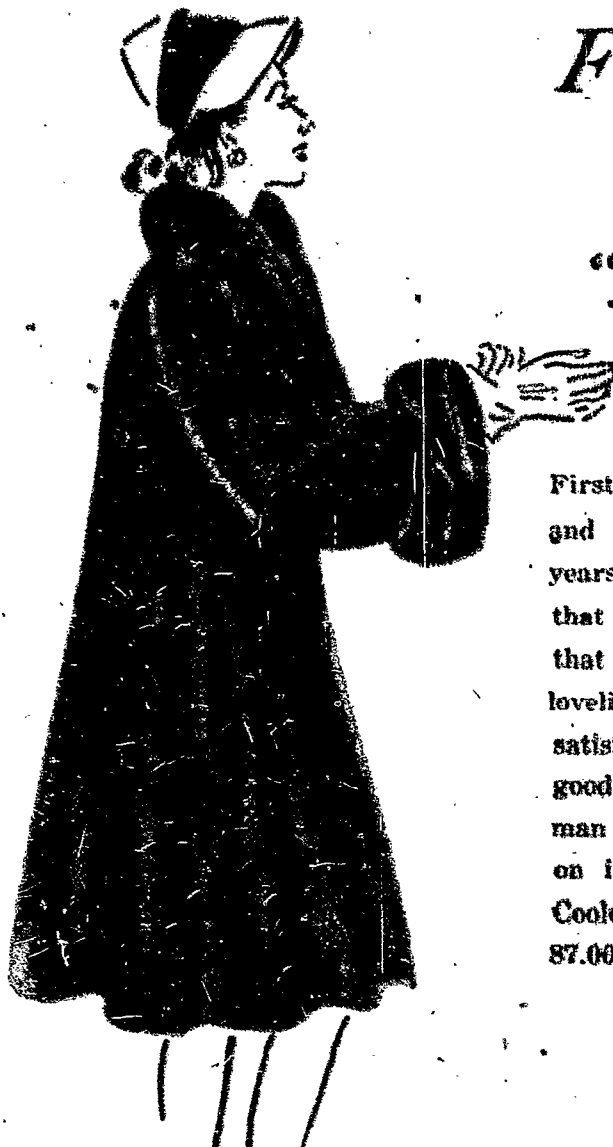
