Dean Urges Separate Pharmacy Units For Army and Navy Corps

BROOKLYN. — Because of the important role played by pharmacists in the war effort and the varied responsibilities that are given those trained in pharmacy, Dr. John L. Dandrea, Dean of the College of Pharmacy of St. John's University has urged that a separate pharmacy corps be established as a distinct unit of the army and navy. Dr. Dandrea pointed out that the Government has already passed a law granting commissions to graduate pharmacists and that the present time is being introduced to permit ratings to Lieutenant Colonel.

"So important is the pharmacist in the war effort that Congress has recommended that speedy steps be taken in colleges of pharmacy be included with those of medical, dental and engineering colleges in the appropriation of funds so that they may continue their college studies," Dr. Dandrea stated. "Likewise, members of new boards in Selective Service are recognizing the importance of the study of pharmacy."

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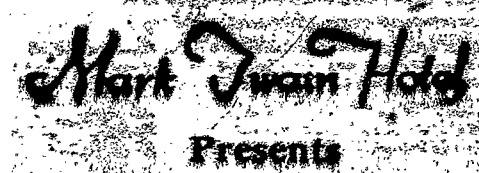
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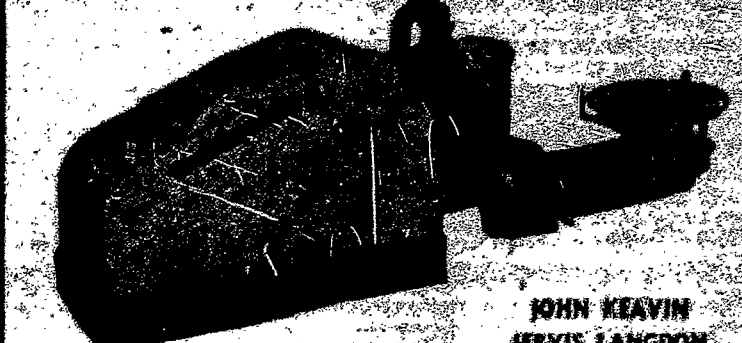
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Elmira Weddings
