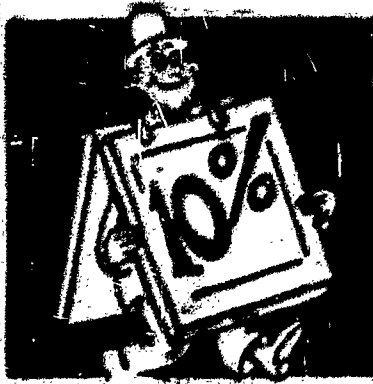
Mr. and Mrs. Tobin will make their home in Auburn.

## MARKS PATRONAL FEAST

AUBURN.—St. Mary's Parish will observe the Feast of Our Lady of the Assumption, the patronal feast of the Church, on Sunday, Aug. 16. There will be a Triduum in her honor commencing on Thursday evening, Aug. 14, at 7:30 and closing on Sunday morning. The devotions will be in charge of Rev. Luke Misset of the Pamonalet's congregation.

St. Mary's Parish will be seventy-four years old on Aug. 13. During the years from 1868 through 1908 the population of Auburn increased and the growth of Catholicity necessitated the formation of a new Parish. On Aug. 13, 1868, the Rt. Rev. Bishop McQuaid paid a visit to Auburn and organized St. Mary's Parish, the first parish formed under the Most Rev. Bishop's administration of the See of Rochester. The Bishop called the

new parish after the Feast of the day, "St. Mary's of the Assumption." The Rev. Thomas Maher was appointed pastor and immediately rented a house at No. 34 State St., where he held his first church services. In the course of time he made use of "Tallman Hall," corner of State and Mill Streets, and finally, after consulting with his ever increasing parishioners, purchased a site on Clark Street where he erected a wooden structure 50 by 70 feet in size.

It has been said that the worshippers at the First Mass consisted of one man and perhaps two women.

Within a year the modest dwelling was unable to accommodate all who came to worship and Rev. M. J. Loughlin, who succeeded Father Maher in 1869, purchased the property adjoining the old church for the sum of \$4,100 and in 1871 began the erection of the present church. On April 29, 1877, the ceremony of the consecration of St. Mary's Church by Most Rev. Bishop McQuaid took place and Bishop Lynch of Charleston preached the sermon in the presence of Bishop Ryan and a large number of priests and parishioners. On Sept. 8, 1877, Rev. William Mulheron was appointed pastor. He commenced plans for a School which was opened on Jan. 7, 1881. Father Mulheron died in 1912 and his place was taken by Rev. William Payne. Father John McGrath, a former assistant at St. Mary's became pastor in 1925 following the death of Father Payne. The present pastor, Dr. Cowen, was appointed to St. Mary's in 1932.
