B. E. (Member of the British Empire) was conferred by King George VI. The meeting was presided over by the Most Rev. Francis Vashagilly, Bishop of Trichur, and Christians and non-Christians spoke.

Farm Work For Youth Discussed

By Elmer Murphy WASHINGTON. - Announcement that the entrance of Mexican laborers into the United States is to be facilitated, that they may assist in the harvesting of seasonal crops in our Western States, draws attention to the broad program of policies recently formulated by the Conference on Young Workers in Wartime Agriculture, made public by the Children's Bureau of the U. S. Department of Labor.

Resulting from a two-day meeting of representatives of youth-serving agencies, farm and labor organizations, and Federal offices, the program concurred itself with certain basic measures felt necessary to safeguard young people who go to work on farms. The same program is expected to help toward the maximum of production.

The program recommends that community programs for the recruitment and employment in agriculture of persons under 18 years of age be undertaken to fill only definite and known needs, and then only when workers of proper age and capacity are not available.

The conference felt that such programs should be developed in cooperation with the U. S. Employment Service, and should include:

- (1) Community organization, through State and local committees accepting responsibility for maintaining adequate standards for the protection of young workers. (2) Age limitations, embracing a minimum age of 16 years for hired farm labor, or 18 years if the worker is placed to live away from his family. (3) Protection of educational opportunities for the youths; (4) Precautionary measures before placement, particularly of those who will live away from their families, by requiring written parental consent, documentary evidence of age, physical examination and appropriate immunization.

Suggested means of safeguarding the educational opportunities include (a) employment of pupils 16 and 17 years of age during school hours only if no older workers are available, and (b) limitation of employment of pupils 14 and 15 years of age to vacation times and outside school hours. In this latter instance, the conference felt no release from school should be permitted, nor should any modification of the school program be made unless the need can be met in no other practicable way.

Work for which emergency recruitment of young people is being undertaken, the report on the conference says, is of two main types. The more important, in terms of the number of workers employed, is the seasonal harvest of fruits, vegetables and other crops, which requires large groups of workers over a short period, and sometimes may necessitate the bringing together of workers to live in camps. Recruitment of young people for work on individual farms constitutes the other type of need.

"Although the actual need for young workers in agriculture is not widespread at present," the report states, "it is likely to increase as the war continues and existing labor reserves diminish. To the extent that school-age youths are to be used either now or in the future, their living and working conditions must be safeguarded. Precautions in the use of these youths on the farms are especially important because of the existence of child labor abuses in some types of agricultural work. Every effort should be made to prevent comparable abuses from occurring in any employment of young people recruited to meet new wartime needs. Farm employment for suitable age groups if well planned and supervised can be made beneficial to the young people as well as productive for farmers and growers."

The report warns that actual recruitment of youths in advance of the determination of need for their services should be discouraged as injurious to morale. It calls supervision the key to success or failure of the work of young people on farms, and recommends that super-

Urges Recollection Day For Youth Groups

NEW ORLEANS. - Writing to pastors on the Day of Recollection for members of the Catholic Youth Organization, at Holy Angels Academy for girls and at Holy Cross College for boys, the Most Rev. Joseph F. Rummel, Archbishop of New Orleans, said:

"We should remember that we are living in a critical time and that our young people are exposed to exceptional dangers and temptations. Every means should be taken advantage of to strengthen them spiritually and morally, so that they may be prepared to cope successfully with the problems and anxieties that harass their souls and endanger their sanctification. Hence, it is hoped that from every parish there will be in attendance at these recollection exercises a representative group of young people who will in turn, carry home with them such spiritual and moral strength that they will become edifying examples for others."

vision include arrangements for transportation, working conditions, rest periods, meals, living arrangements, and the planning of work suited to the abilities and experience of the young workers.

This report, in turn, has served to bring to attention the fact that, while the United Nations are fighting to preserve freedom, our people are being subjected to certain "controls." Rationing, priorities, allocations and price controls have come to be taken for granted. The "controls" will probably increase before peace is achieved. There is a move for the registration of women; the Man Power Commission is studying a plan of mobilization which may affect 60,000,000 persons; regulation of employment, so as to prevent the shifting of workers from one plant to another, is talked about; assignment of jobs is also a topic of discussion.
