

HOLY HOUR INTENTION TO BE VICTORY, JUST PEACE

CHICAGO - A prayer for the "victory of our nation and a peace in justice and charity" will be the intention of the Holy Name Holy Hour to be held in Soldier Field, September 13, the Most Rev. Samuel A. Stritch, Archbishop of Chicago, announced today.

More than 225,000 Holy Name members as well as all Catholics in the Archdiocese have been asked to join in the demonstration.

Things for which we are fighting are in the very makeup of Western culture and they are things which have come to us from out of the Gospel of Christ. Archbishop Stritch said in his announcement "With hatred for no man or people, professing no stupid ideas of nationalism, racism, classism or tribalism, eager to accord all men justice and to live with them in charity, we, calm, deliberate, united, are engaged in a war for the defense of the things we prize, our cultural heritage.

"On the shoulders of Chicago Catholics and likewise the Catholics of this nation rests an obligation to pray for the victory of our beloved country. We are earnest and intent upon securing victory and a lasting peace. For this end, we now ask all Catholics in the Chicago Archdiocese to pray."
