

Cited For Valor, Auburn World War I Veteran Gets Two War Department Medals

AUBURN—Walter J. Sanderson of 21 Easterly Avenue, has just received two Medal Decorations for gallant service in World War I. The word was received this week from the Secretary of War and the War Department in Washington, D. C. Mr. Sanderson is a member of the Sanderson Rice Post, American Legion, a guard at Auburn Prison, a member of Auburn Council Knights of Columbus and a communicant at St. Mary's Church. Sanderson was awarded the Purple Heart Medal with two bars and oak leaf cluster for military merit and the Silver Star Medal with two bars and oak leaf cluster for wounds received in action, July 22nd and November 8, 1918 and for gallantry in action at the Second Battle of the Marne. He enlisted with the First Conn. Infantry in 1918 and saw service on the Mexican Border and on his return was honorably discharged and placed on Reserve and was recalled to service with the 102nd Infantry Medical Detachment, 26th Division. He sailed for France with the A. E. F. in September 1917 and was over seas for twenty months. He was the first Ulica Knight of Columbus to see action in France. The citations follow:

gallantry and meritorious service on the field in the capture of Tracy Bellant, Girty, Bourgeois Woods, Rocket Woods, Hill 190 overlooking Chateau Thierry, Krepky, Buzet, Kpieda, Trugny and La Fave Woods to the Toul-Verdun, Fere-en-Tardenois Road, during the advance of this division against the enemy in the second battle of the Marne from July 18 to 23, 1918 and have read with much pleasure the reports from your regimental brigade commander regarding your gallant conduct on July 11, 1918 though wounded, aiding your wounded comrades under heavy artillery barrage. LONDON.—Responding to a desire expressed by King George that the third anniversary of the war, which occurs on Sept. 3, be observed as a national day of prayer. His Eminence Arthur Cardinal Hinsley, Archbishop of Westminster, has issued a statement in behalf of the Hierarchy appointing Sept. 3 and the following Sunday, Sept. 6, as days of prayer. "The issues at stake are so momentous and the result of the conflict so poised in the balance," His Eminence said, "that we ought to redouble our prayers and sacrifices to obtain from Almighty God the strength which He alone can give."

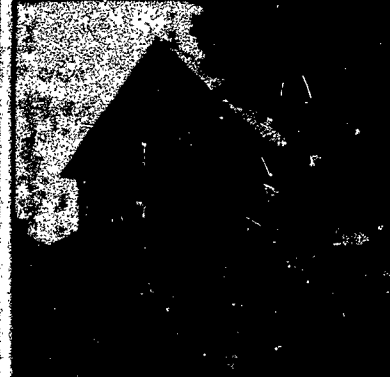
