

Protests Deportation Of Jews From Holland

NEW YORK - According to news received by the Netherlands Information Bureau here the deportation of Dutch Jews to German-occupied territory in East Europe has begun at an announced rate of 600 daily. Some 60,000 Jews have been rounded up in preparation for expulsion. The Catholic daily Nieuwe Dierden in a dispatch from Willemstad, has stated editorially: "To everyone who understands the Netherlands language this Catholic paper makes open protest of this injustice. Soon the one God of Jew of Catholic, and of Protestant, the God who led His people out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage, will act on His word."

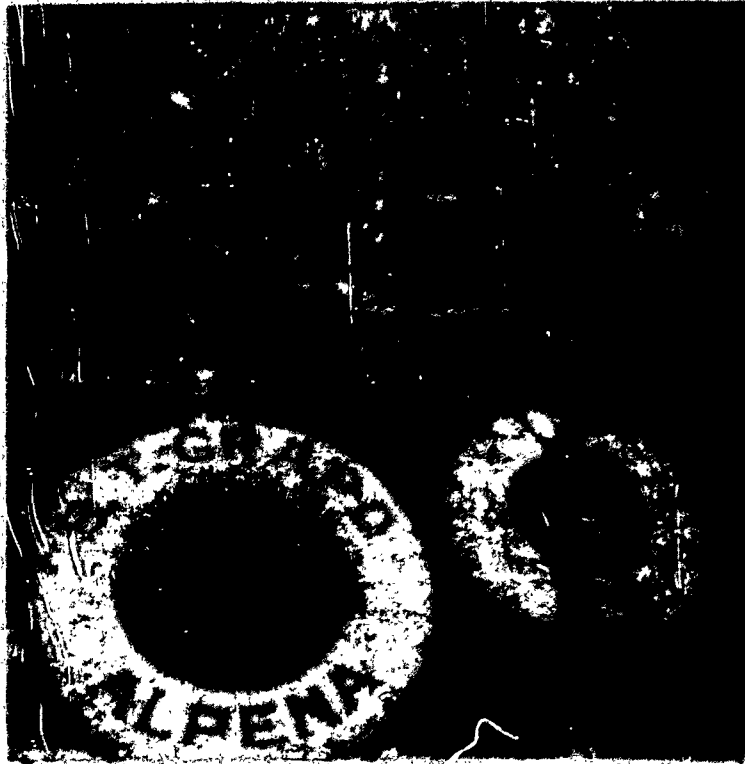

CHINESE NURSE, THAILAND DOCTOR, CONVERTS, WED IN CEREMONY AT DUBLIN

DUBLIN. - The church which Cardinal Newman designed here saw an interesting wedding when Miss Jean Hu Wasson, a Chinese nurse in a Dublin hospital, was married to Dr. Lert Srichandra, a young Thailander, who made his medical studies at University College, Dublin.

Mrs. Srichandra was received into the church a week before, and her wedding day was also the day of her first Holy Communion. Dr. Srichandra has been a Catholic since school days at the Irish Jesuit College at Hong Kong. He and two compatriots, also Catholics, Dr. Kevin Sombuntham and Dr. Andre Tanprast, spent over eight years in Ireland, first as medical students and recently as doctors. Dr. Sombuntham's sister, Lamom, joined him in Dublin four years ago and studied science at University College. She also became a Catholic.

The morning after the wedding Dr. and Mrs. Srichandra and their friends left Dublin by mailboat on the first stage of their 15,000-mile journey to Bangkok. On the eve of their departure a farewell party was given for them at a Dublin hotel. Among those present were the Rev. T. Grogan, who officiated at the wedding; F. Boland, of the Department of External Affairs; members of Dublin's medical fraternity, including Premier de Valera's son, and many graduates and undergraduates of the University.
