SOLEMN TRIDUUM CLOSES

AUBURN—The Solemn Triduum in honor of Our Lady of the Assumption came to a close on Sunday morning at the 11 o'clock Mass when the Papal Blessing was imparted by Rev. Luke Missott of the Passionist Congregation. Father Missott preached at all the Masses on Sunday morning as well as each evening during the Triduum. Each of his sermons was based upon the life of the Blessed Virgin. On Thursday evening he told of her life and of the fact that she could have saved herself a lot of sorrow, if she refused to be the mother of God for in accepting the great honor bestowed upon her she also knew that she had accepted a life of sorrow and would become the Mother of Sorrows.

On Friday evening he chose the virtues of prudence, both natural and supernatural, which he discussed in connection with the life of the Blessed Virgin. He said that each of us must realize that we have one aim in life and that is our eternal destiny. We must receive the sacraments and say our prayers in order to reach this destiny and the obstacles which we must overcome are the occasions of sin which must be avoided at all

costs. He said that the Blessed Mother was the perfect example of prudence and everyone should follow her example if they wished to reach their goal in life, no matter what the world might dictate.

Saturday evening's sermon was entitled "Fortitude." This virtue was personified by the Blessed Virgin in the fullest degree, he said. Fortitude is strength and the Blessed Virgin was strong at all times despite the many trials she had in life. For all our sorrows are as nothing compared to the life of sorrow which she endured, for she had to live to see her son persecuted and nailed to the cross for the sins of others. We must possess this virtue now as never before he said for the war has brought to us many new trials and temptations, many sorrows and separations, which we never believed possible.

On Sunday morning he spoke of the Assumption of Our Lady and explained why Our Lord would not allow his Blessed Mother to suffer the corruption of the grave. Imitate Mary always, he said, be like her in thought, word and deed and you will reach your eternal destiny.

Throng At Mass For Britain's Leading Ace

LONDON—The floor and gallery of Westminster Cathedral were filled when a Requiem Mass was celebrated today for Wing Commander Brendan (Paddy) Finucane, 21-year-old leading war ace of the Royal Air Force, who failed to return after leading what was described as the biggest mass attack on enemy targets in France. His Eminence Arthur Cardinal Hinsley, Archbishop of Westminster, presided at the Mass, the celebrant of which was Monsignor Benuchamp, Vicar General of the R. A. F. Chaplains' staff. Father Patrick B. Fay, senior chaplain of the U. S. Army Air Force, assisted.

NEW TOWER BELL

Announcement was also made of the installation of a tower bell in Our Lady of the Lake Church—a gift of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph McDonald, parishioners. The pastor explained that although the church had been serving the spiritual needs of the congregation for 73 years without interruption, on the same site, the people had never been assembled by the ringing of a bell.

Before 1870 the Catholic population of King Ferry was attended by Father McCool, whose residence was maintained at Union Springs. Holy Mass was offered in the various homes of parishioners before the erection of the first small frame church on the present site. In 1873 Father Rafferty was appointed the first resident pastor at King Ferry and he remained in charge until his death in 1908.

Father Geiger appointed Mr. Hugh Rafferty to attend to the ringing of the bell. He explained that the bell would be rung for three minutes beginning five minutes before the hour appointed for Divine Service. He also suggested that the bell be rung during the Elevation in the Mass and at Benediction, explaining that shut-in Catholics are often inspired to ejaculatory prayer when their attention is drawn to the fact that the Blessed Sacrament is being raised in benediction over the people of the community.

Attention was also drawn by the pastor to the new set of altar linens and lace antependia, a gift of a Rochester friend, and to the massive white iron flower urn, which marks the entrance to Our Lady of the Lake Cemetery, a gift of Frances Smith of Auburn. A calvary group of stone statues and crucifix is to be erected in the cemetery in September.
