Aquinas To Open Sept. 8 With Three Training Courses For War Work Added

Aquinas Institute opens its doors to the Catholic Students of Rochester on Tuesday, September 8. Reflecting the emphasis on training for war work, three courses are being added. These include: Fundamental Principles and Practices in Radio; Basic Aeronautics; and Introduction to Business.

Aware that its best contribution to the war program consists in strengthening the existing values of a general education, Aquinas is adding the courses in Radio and Aeronautics in order to give interested and qualified students an opportunity for some specialized work.

The course in Radio will be open only to Seniors since Algebra, Plane Geometry and Physics are pre-requisites. That in aeronautics will be open to qualified Juniors and Seniors. The course in the Introduction to Business will furnish an additional first-year elective.

The existing program in the sciences and in mechanical drawing has been amplified to meet the needs of the increased enrollment in these fields.

Military Stress Basic Courses In High School

"In view of the analysis of recommendation of military authorities, it is most important that our Catholic high school teachers vitalize and modernize the present basic courses in

mathematics and science in preparation for military activities."

This was stated in a letter sent by the Catholic Schools Office of the diocese to the Rev. J. H. O'Loane, C.S.B., Principal of Aquinas Institute, this week.

"How the high school can best serve our Catholic boys and the nation in relation to the military program will be the concern of each high school principal and teacher," the letter states.

"Analysis of a survey of the recommendations of military authorities as to how the high school can help, reveals two salient facts:

"1. That the greatest emphasis should be placed on present basic courses in mathematics and sci-

ence, that more boys should be directed to take these subjects.

"2. That the basic courses in mathematics and science should not be supplanted by special courses, but rather that the basic courses be modernized and vitalized by illustrative and problem materials dealing with aviation, navigation, engineering, etc. It was suggested that such illustrative and problem material might well be substituted for obsolete material that is now contained in mathematics and science courses and textbooks.

Analysis Summarized

"The summary of the analysis of the survey states: Military training in specialized fields such as aviation, engineering, artillery and other fields is organized in relation to and upon the foundation of basic education as now furnished by the secondary school or by the secondary school and college. It is the experienced judgment of responsible military training authorities that the specialized and technical training for military purposes can best be done in schools organized by the Armed Service for that purpose and by an instructional staff of carefully selected professionally trained personnel.

"The secondary school has a vital contribution to make in providing boys with a sound educational background which may serve as the basis for advanced military training. The secondary school may greatly increase its effectiveness first by encouraging boys eligible for the military services, particularly the Air Service, to take those subjects which are basic to technical military training in aviation and other fields; and which are now offered in the secondary school; and second, by strengthening the program through the use of illustrative materials and practical problems and through natural extensions of present offerings upon already existing foundations in mathematics and science, without distorting the present secondary school framework and without sacrificing its basic values for general education purposes." (Basic Educational Requirements for the Military Service, Division of Secondary Education, State Education Department, Albany, N. Y., 1942).

The letter states that military authorities desire that supplementary courses in radioactivity and pre-flight aeronautics be introduced solely as electives with basic courses such as elementary algebra, plane geometry, intermediate algebra, advanced algebra, solid geometry, plane trigonometry, general science, general biology, physics and chemistry, as pre-requisites.

The school program offers opportunities for classes in sewing, cooking, art, music, public speaking, journalism, and business subjects, besides the regular high school schedule. A well equipped gymnasium affords possibilities for inter-class, and inter-school athletic meets.

Extra curricular activities are likewise provided through the Sodality and Mission Societies, and the Thespian and Student Government organizations, all of which help to develop leadership and initiative in the students.

Our Lady of Mercy High School is conducted by the Sisters of

Mercy with a teaching faculty of 24 sisters and one secular instructor. Weekly conferences are held by the Rev. Lawrence B. Casey, religious instructor of the school. Buses bring the students to the school door each morning and call for them in the afternoon.
