Father Joseph Sweeney, a Maryknoll in South China, writes that "there must be something of the spirit in one's work for the past several months I've been on the go constantly, moving from place to place."

"Early in the morning the Japanese blasted the airfield at the head of the railway junction, and hence the trains were held up. I took a rickshaw and arrived at the mission around one in the morning, said Mass and went to bed. I feared to delay the Holy Sacrifice until later in the morning, lest I should get caught again in an air raid and be have to postpone it until the storm ended."

"But yesterday the storm caught me napping, and I had to seek a hasty retreat to the tubular in the hot rising sun and sultry air, without benefit of Mass—or food for the inner man."

"This afternoon the report came that twelve planes were in the vicinity of Wuchow and might be heading in this direction; and so there was another alarm. They are most annoying and waste a good part of the day, although very often these forced gatherings can work unto good as they give us a chance to instruct our people."

Shell Shocks

"Yesterday, Japanese guns a mile away from us," writes Father Joseph Sweeney, from the Maryknoll Leper Colony in South China, "went into action. Two stray shells which landed into the river gave us time to take cover. Another, clearing the church by inches, landed on a spot over which we had just led thirty women from the church to a gully in the rear—another instance of the very special providence of God we are enjoying."

"Since writing you about our desperate financial need, an even worse situation has been born. Famine prices obtain, with our chief commodities, rice and peanut oil, selling at fantastic figures. The next three months will undoubtedly be a time of grave
