CORNING—Two more Corning boys have been added to the long list of those who are doing an excellent job for Uncle Sam. They are Sgt. James T. O'Hara, son of Joseph L. O'Hara, 176 State St. and Lt. Richard O. Deegan, son of Thomas Deegan of Corning.

Sgt. O'Hara, who is a graduate of Corning Free Academy and Colgate University, has been selected for Officers' Training School at Camp Lee, Va. He entered the service on Mar. 27, 1942, and was sent to Fort Jackson, S. C., where within a few weeks he was promoted to sergeant. Recently he was appointed staff sergeant. After a brief furlough in Corning, Sgt. O'Hara will report at Camp Lee.

Lt. Deegan, a graduate of St. Patrick's School and Northside High School, completed his training as a second lieutenant at Fort Benning, Ga., during the past week. Entering the Army in July, 1941, he was stationed at Camp Croft, S. C., for some time and was named a corporal there in Dec., 1941. His appointment to Officers' Training School came in May of this year.

After a stay in Corning, Lt. Deegan has returned to Fort Benning, where he will be an instructor in the Infantry School.

Pre-flight Training**

NEW ORLEANS—A priest, five Brothers and four Sisters are in the class of 50 taking pre-flight training at Loyola University of the South here. They are the Rev. E. John Babin, C.S.S.R., a teacher at St. Alphonsus' School; Sister Mary Aiden and Sister Elphege of the School Sisters of Notre Dame; Brother Felician Fourrier, Brother Nicholas Geisenbert, Brother Alfred Kolb, Brother Frederick Kraus and Brother Anselm Maguire of the Brothers of the Sacred Heart.

The course, sponsored by the Government includes meteorology, navigation, general service of aircraft and civil air regulations. It is for high school teachers who, in turn, will teach basic aviation to their high school students so that, upon graduation from high school, they will be ready to begin actual flight and combat training.

**REGULATIONS GOVERNING
MAIL FOR U. S. PRISONERS
IN PHILIPPINES ANNOUNCED**

WASHINGTON—Mail and packages destined for military prisoners and civilians in the Philippines Islands may be sent by their next of kin in this country only when they have received orders of authorization from the Chief of Staff, General of the Army in Washington.

Announcement was made by Richard C. Bartholomew, Administrative Assistant, Insular and Foreign Operations, American Red Cross, that those next of kin wishing to send letters or packages via a Red Cross ship of neutral registry must present at the post office such letter of authorization otherwise postal authorities will refuse to accept their mail. It is required that the person wishing to send the mail shall have been listed as next of kin by the prisoner or intern, and that the addresses shall have been listed by the Department as being a prisoner or an intern.

Thus far, the Red Cross announced, only 10 names have been listed by the Japanese.
