

War Prisoners In Different Camps, Brothers Are United By Vatican Aid

LONDON — Two brothers serving in the British army in the Middle East, both captured by the Italians and imprisoned in different camps have been reunited through the instrumentality of the Vatican.

Five months ago Mrs. Kathleen Stewart, of Peterborough, wrote to the *Evening News* saying that two relatives captured at intervals of six months, were in camps which were only a short distance from each other and asking if something

could be done to get them together. The paper advised the woman to put the facts before the Vatican Information Bureau, and Mrs. Stewart has now heard from the Apostolic Delegate here that the boys have been brought together. She has also heard from one of the boys to tell of their meeting.

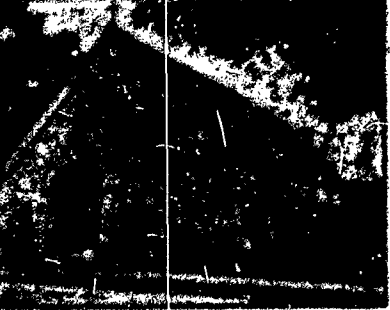

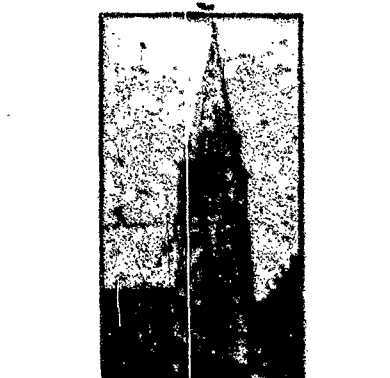
