AUBURN — Rev. Joseph J. Corcoran, C.R.C., Notre-Dame, Indiana, son of Mrs. Jeremiah J. Corcoran of Chicago, has received his commission as first lieutenant in the Army and will report to Harvard University, School of Chaplains on September 3. Mrs. Corcoran was a former resident of Auburn and has many relatives living in Auburn.

Theological Reviews Revived In Spain

MADRID — The National Congress of Biblical Study and Theology, held at Zaragoza and Madrid, have proved to be points of departure for a general movement of research and study worthy of the older school of Spanish theology. Former reviews such as *Anales Sacra Tarraconensis* and *Estudios Eclesiasticos* have been revived and two new publications devoted to theological subjects have come to light.

Archive *Teologico Granadino* is published by the Pontifical Faculty of Theology at Granada. *Revista Espanola de Teologia* is edited by the Francisco Suarez Institute, a branch of the Superior Council of Scientific Research. The latter is published under the supervision of the Most Rev. Leopoldo Eijo y Garay, Bishop of Madrid, and with the cooperation of two professors from the Seminary.

Bishop Pontificates

VATICAN CITY — The Most Rev. Edward Count O'Rourke, Titular Bishop of Sophe and former Bishop of Danzig pontificated at the solemn Mass in the chapel of the Irish College of Rome in commemoration of the episcopal silver jubilee of His Holiness Pope Pius XII. Australian Catholic booksellers report a substantial demand for all available religious literature as a result of the influx of American troops in considerable numbers.

One contingent of American soldiers which counts Joseph Pettito and Felix Puzin of New York in its number provides singing for many Catholic functions here.

Bishop Asks Prayers for Storm Protection

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla. — Prayers for protection against destructive storms are asked by the Most Rev. Joseph P. Hurley, Bishop of St. Augustine, in instructions issued through the Very Rev. George Rockett, Chancellor.

It is urged that during August, September and October, when the danger of "northeasters" and hurricanes is greatest in this area, the oration "Ad repellendas tempestates" be said in all Masses in which the rubrics permit. The members of the laity are also asked to offer their own prayers for protection against storms.

The liturgical prayer, "Ad repellendas tempestates," dates back many centuries.

NEW ORLEANS — A priest, five Brothers and four Nuns are in the class of 20 taking pre-flight training at Loyola University of the South here. They are the Rev. St. John Hahn, C.S.B., a teacher at St. Alphonsus' School; Sister Mary Aiden and Sister Blanche of the School Sisters of Holy Names; Brother Paulien Switzer, Brother Nicholas Galambier, Brother Alfred Kell, Brother Frederick Kraus and Brother Augustin Maguire of the Brothers of the Sacred Heart.

The course, sponsored by the Government, includes meteorology, navigation, general service of aircraft and civil regulations. It is for high school teachers who, in turn, will teach basic aviation to their high school students so that upon graduation from high school they will be ready to begin actual flight and combat training.

Most Rev. William Aloysius Griffin, Bishop of Trenton. Born, Nov. 20, 1855 at Newark, N. J. Ordained Aug. 15, 1910. On faculty of Seton Hall College, South Orange, N. J., 1910-25. Pastoral work in Diocese and Archdiocese of Newark, 1925-33. Named a Papal Chamberlain, 1929. National Treasurer, Society for the Propagation of the Faith, 1935. Elected Titular Bishop of Sapaevus, Feb. 26, 1938, and named Auxiliary of Newark. Consecrated, May 1, 1938, at Newark. Appointed Bishop of Trenton, May 21, 1940. Installed July 23, 1940.
