

Quigley Named To Post In Department of Commerce

AUBURN—Edward T. Quigley, a native of Auburn, a graduate of St. Mary's School and a boyhood friend of the Rev. Dr. William E. Cowen, pastor, has been named assistant solicitor for the Department of Commerce succeeding James J. O'Hare, retired. Mr. Quigley entered the service of the Department of Commerce and Labor in 1904 and was appointed chief clerk of the Solicitor's Office in 1908. He was promoted to be assistant solicitor in 1911 and served in that position until 1920 when he resigned to enter private practice of law in the service of the Department of Washington. He was recalled to the service of the Department of

Commerce in 1932 as senior attorney and assistant to the solicitor. Mr. Quigley was secretary of the American-Canadian Fisheries Conference in 1918; he represented the Department of Commerce at an International Conference held in Berne, Switzerland in 1934 in connection with the formulation of a convention on international air law. Enroll Women In VED Courses Same As Men

For the first time since the Vocational Education for National Defense War Industries training program started, over two years ago, women will be accepted on an equal basis with men when the fall VED training program gets underway September 8 with day, evening and all-night courses, Verne A. Bird, VED Director announced.

"The classes are designed not only for beginners in skilled trades, but also for persons who have some training but are not qualified for advancement without further instruction," Mr. Bird said. This applies to thousands of men and women who are now holding their first jobs in war plants.

Mr. Bird also urged many men and women employed in various fields not essential to the war effort to enroll in these courses to prepare for the large scale shortage of skilled workers that has been forecast for the near future. Mr. Bird pointed out that many of these non-essential jobs will cease to exist as priorities become more stringent.

The VED Director also explained that women can now register for the first time directly at the school as well as at the United States Employment Service.

The drive for getting 2000 women to begin immediate training will continue, Mr. Bird said, until the quota is filled.
At Junior Vocational High starting Tuesday, September 8, women will be able to learn welding. The new shop has just been completed, according to Supervisor Frederick O. E. Rath. PRIEST HEADS SCHOOL HE FIRST SERVED AS LAYMAN

PORTSMOUTH, R. I. — The Very Rev. E. Gregory Borgstedt, O. S. B., Prior and newly appointed Headmaster of the Priory School, was a lay master at the school in the spring term of the first school year — 1927.

He becomes the school's second Headmaster, succeeding the Rev. J. Hugh Diman, O.S.B., founder of the school, who has just resigned. Father Borgstedt joined the Portsmouth Community in the summer of 1927 and later was sent for preliminary studies to St. Benedict's Abbey, Fort Augustus, Scotland. He returned in 1931 and made his theological studies in Washington, D. C. In 1934, Father Borgstedt went back to Portsmouth as an instructor in religion, Latin and English. He was appointed Prior in 1940 when Father Diman resigned from the post.

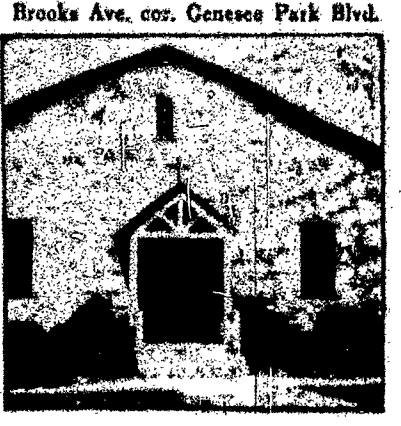
