Rochester Delegates Laud St. Louis Verein Sessions

Rochester delegates to the national convention of the Catholic Central Verein of America and of the National Catholic Women's Union, held at St. Louis, Mo., August 22-26, on return home stated that it was one of the best meetings of the two organizations ever held.

The motto of the convention pointed out that the troubled conditions of the world were due to the deChristianizing process that has been operating for years. Consequently the addresses, discussions and resolutions were all directed to the rechristianization of society in all its phases, political, social, economic and religious.

The convention was unusually well-attended, and was distinguished by the number of the members of the Hierarchy that attended the opening services in the Cathedral and remained throughout the convention to take part in the deliberations. The religious orders, particularly the Jesuits and Redemptorists, were well represented.

One of the outstanding features of the convention was the Youth Clinic held on Monday afternoon, Aug. 24. Here the problems confronting youth were diagnosed, and suitable remedies were prescribed. The frankness with which the speakers approached the various phases of the question, and the fine discussions which followed the main addresses were stated by all to be most refreshing. It is hoped that much progress will be made in the coming year in the matter of the youth movement.

The Coronado Hotel, where the convention sessions were held, afforded a splendid opportunity for the delegates and those visiting to stand around in groups and review what had taken place in the sessions. This important phase of the conventions of the two organizations was never better exemplified than at this year's convention. Those from the Middle West and Far West mingled with the eastern delegates and there was a happy exchange of ideas between the industrial east and the agricultural west.

Emphasis was laid on the importance of preparing now for the post-war reconstruction period. In this connection the various addresses of Pope Pius XII in regard to peace and reconstruction after the war were carefully considered and were reflected in the resolutions adopted.

Another outstanding feature of the convention was the Credit Union conference held on Monday night. The method employed was the question and answer method, and one practical point after another was raised and settled.

Local Delegates Attend

Laura K. Schilling was delegate from Rochester to the National Catholic Women's Union convention and the Rev. Joseph H. Gelfell, William J. Fuchrer and the Hon. Philip H. Donnelly were delegates to the Catholic Central Verein of America convention.

"It was a great convention," stated Judge Donnelly. "There were those who opposed holding a convention, but the view to hold the convention prevailed. Wise, indeed, was the decision to hold the convention. At no time were there more important questions for consideration, and at no time did a convention face difficult matters more bravely and effectively."

The St. Louis convention will stand out as one of the most important in the history of the Catholic Central Verein of America and of the National Catholic Women's Union.

The state convention of the Catholic Central Verein of America and of the National Catholic Women's Union will take place at Buffalo Sept. 5-7. Large numbers will attend from Rochester.

Religious Observes 80th Anniversary Of Her Profession

MADRID — Mother Maria Ventura del Carmen, who was born at Salamanca on July 16, 1847 — the Feast of Mt. Carmel — has celebrated the eightieth anniversary of her taking the habit of a Religious. The event which commemorated took place in the Royal Palace of La Granja in the presence of her godparents, Queen Isabella II and her Consort Prince Francisco Javier.

In 1936, Mother Maria Ventura was incarcerated and remained in prison until the liberation of Bilbao. Notwithstanding her advanced age, she enjoys exceptionally good health and participates in all the services prescribed by the rule of her order.
