In October, 1941, while stationed at Fort Lewis, Ore., he attained his present rank and was assigned to duty in the Philippines. In February he was cited in press dispatches from Bataan for having personally led the 31st U. S. Infantry in gallant action. Mrs. Bowes, the former Miss Roselmer McKee of Cumberland, Md., and two daughters are now living in Maryland. Mrs. Bowes, who is a graduate of the Children's Hospital in Washington, D. C. is now engaged in war work as a nurse. Lt. Col. Bowes is a nephew of Mrs. H. A. Argue and a cousin of Dr. Thomas H. Argue of this city.

WASHINGTON UNIVERSITIES RECEIVE LARGE LEGACIES

NEW BEDFORD, Mass.—The Catholic University of America and Georgetown University, both in Washington, D. C., receive legacies of \$5,000 each in the will of Edward P. Harrington, of this city. Mr. Harrington was a Treasury Department official in Washington for more than four decades. BISHOP DE ANDREA NAMED TO ARGENTINE COMMISSION

Miguel de Andrea, Titular Bishop of Trujillo, was appointed to the Special Commission of the Capital in charge of improved housing for the working class. Argentina's general housing plan now has under construction 100 living quarters for workers in Buenos Aires and 500 in the Province of San Juan.

Nazis Ban Religious Booklets For Soldiers

LONDON.—Publication of booklets for distribution to German soldiers to meet their religious needs has been banned by Nazi authorities, according to a radio broadcast from Vatican City, Sunday. Heretofore Catholic authorities in Germany had been permitted to issue such booklets and two of a series have appeared, the radio speaker said, but the latest Official Gazette of the Field Bishop in the German armed forces reveals that further publications have been forbidden.

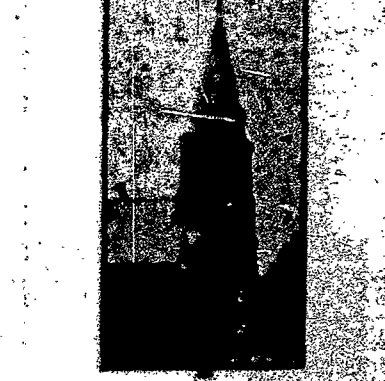

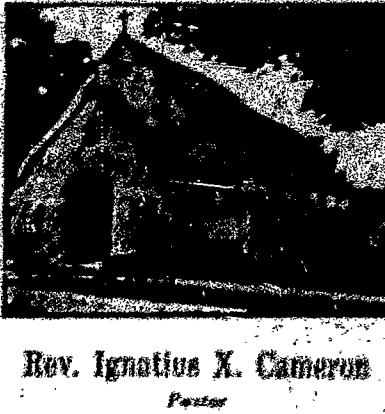
