

Auburn Employee Honored In War Bond Ceremony

AUBURN—Last week the Auburn plant of the American Locomotive Company was the recipient of a banner and certificate from the United States Treasury Department in recognition of the fact that 92.3 of the force had subscribed to U. S. War Bonds through the payroll deduction plan.

The banner and certificate were accepted for the company by Manager John Thomas and for the employees by Mr. Timothy J. Murphy. In presenting the banner and certificate Mr. William Haefner, chairman of the Cayuga County War Savings Bond Committee said: "By authority and on behalf of the treasurer of the United States, I have the honor to present to your factory this certificate and banner. I place them in the hands of the oldest employe."

To the accompaniment of enthusiastic applause, Mr. Murphy received the banner with a few appropriate words of appreciation on behalf of his fellow workers. Mr. Thomas spoke briefly for the company. Mr. Murphy has been connected with the American Locomotive Company for forty-five years and is the oldest employe in point of service.

Characterized by his fellow workers as "one of the kindest men they have ever known" and by the firm as one of their most valued employes, Mr. Murphy is a quiet and unassuming individual.

How few people realize that this man who was once a student at St.

Mary's School and at present a member of the parish, has been three-fourths of the way around the world in supervising the erection of the great Diesel engines. As a young boy he became interested in this sort of work and after an apprenticeship, he commenced his work of traveling in various parts of the world to supervise the erection of engines.

Mr. Murphy follows closely all accounts of the war for he spent many months in Africa and knows the country and its people, and the British Isles are a real source of interest to him for he visited many places where war is now raging. There is scarcely a place in the United States that he has not visited.

Among the foreign countries in which he has supervised the erection of engines are France, British Isles, Italy, Russia, Ceylon, Central America, Brazil, and Africa. Mr. Murphy is still doing his part for the war for Major R. W. Chandler of the Syracuse office of the Rochester Ordnance District of the United States Army in addressing the men of the American Locomotive Company referred to them as the vital part of the war and likened them to "soldiers in overalls."

PORTSMOUTH, R. I. — The Very Rev. E. Gregory Borgstedt, O. S. B., Prior and newly appointed Headmaster of the Priory School, was a lay master at the school in the spring term of the first school year — 1927.

He becomes the school's second Headmaster, succeeding the Rev. J. Hugh Diman, O.S.B., founder of the school, who has just resigned. He was appointed Prior in 1936 when Father Diman resigned from the post.

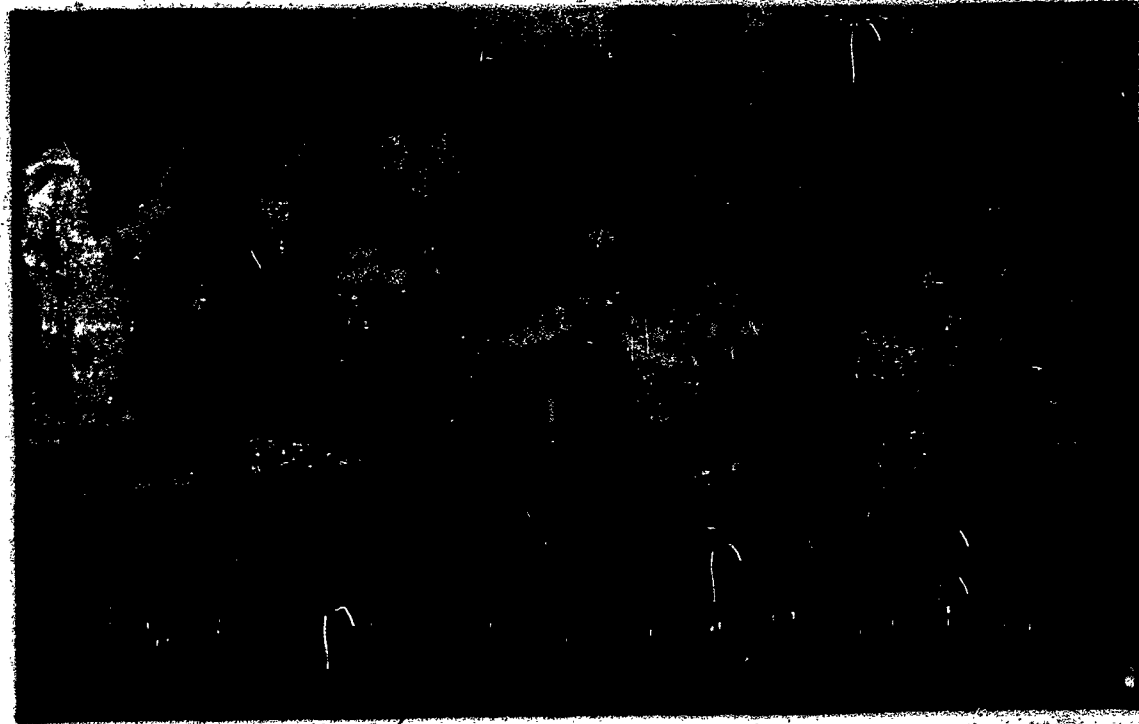
