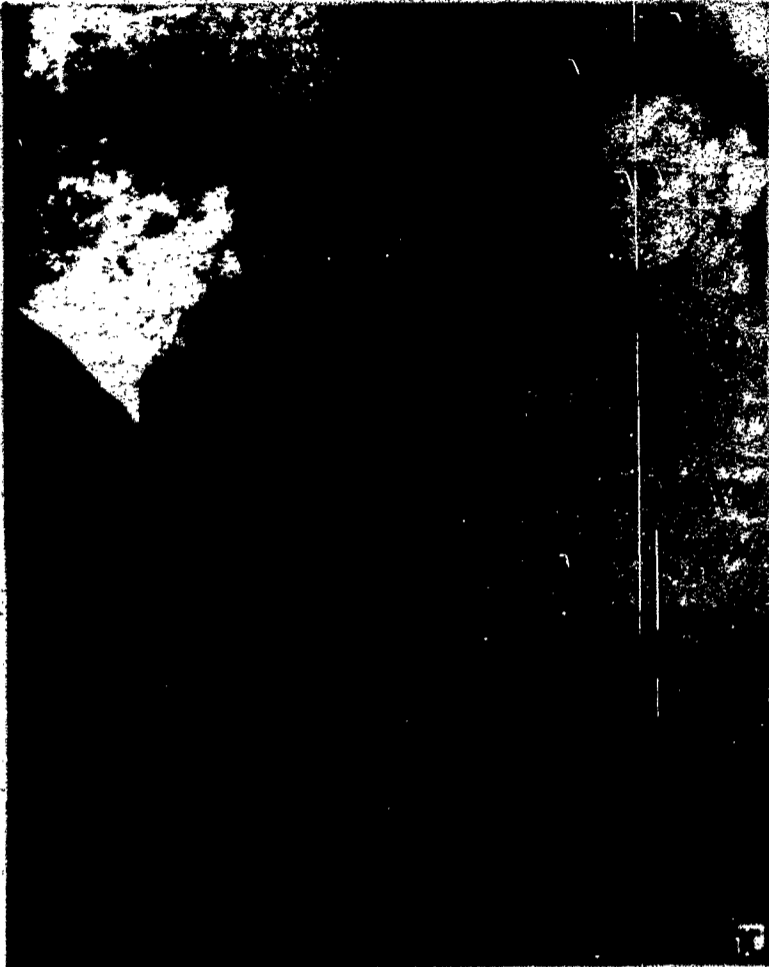

MALTA PRESS NOTES CONVDY ARRIVED AS NOVENA ENDED

LONDON.—The recent arrival of a large convoy at Malta with supplies and reinforcements coincided with the close of a public novena asking God's protection on the island. It was noted in the Malta press.

The ceremony will draw the relatives and friends of the souls of the faithful departed whose bodies rest in the beautiful cemetery grounds on Lake Avenue.

The ecclesiastical procession will include prelates and priests of the city and county, students of St. Bernard's and of St. Andrew's Seminaries. The Rt. Rev. Mgr. J. F. Goggin, rector of St. Bernard's Seminary will be Master of Ceremony.

Escorting the Bishop will be members of Rochester Regiment, Knights of St. John in full dress uniform in command of Colonel Frederick J. Wegman.

The procession will wind its way through the lanes of the cemetery and conclude at All Souls Chapel where His Excellency, Bishop Kearney will address the crowd on the significance of the occasion.

Each year the ceremony attracts a large gathering of the laity. Many, after visiting the graves of beloved ones, stop at the Bishop's Crypt in All Souls Chapel to remember in their prayers the Most Rev. Bernard J. McQuaid, the Most Rev. Thomas F. Hickey and the Most Rev. John F. O'Hera, Bishops of Rochester who are at rest there.

750 Diocesan Teachers To Confer On Sept. 18

BISHOP KEARNEY TO OPEN PROGRAM WITH MASS, SERMON

Host to 75 teachers of the parochial schools, Diocese of Rochester at the 38th Annual Teacher's Institute on Friday, Sept. 18, will be Aquinas Institute. It is announced today at the Catholic Schools Office, Columbia Civic Centre.

Unlike former years, the day will begin at 10:15 A. M. with Pontifical Low Mass and Sermon by the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester. Sectional meetings will begin at 11:00 A. M. Sister M. Victoria, O.F.M., of Our Lady of Good Counsel School, will talk to teachers of grades 1-4 on "Practical Aids for Primary Teachers," and Rev. John M. Duffy, Superintendent of Schools, will speak to the teachers of grades 5-8 on "Looking at the Whole Program," "Teaching Christian Social Principles in High School" is the topic of the talk by Rev. Charles J. Mahoney, Ph.D., Associate Superintendent of Schools, for the high school grades.

Higher Grades Meeting: At 12:00 P. M. while the teachers of the first six grades are at lunch, Miss Regina Kennedy, Principal of School No. 26, will speak to 11th and 8th grade teachers on "Speech and General Education." She will also talk at 1:00 P. M. on "Speech and the Three R's" for grades 1-4.

Miss Monica Berry, B.S., will speak to the primary grade teachers on "Laying Musical Foundation in the Primary Grades" at 1:00 P. M. while the teachers of the six upper grades are lunching.

At 2:00 P. M. teachers of grades 1-4 will hear Rev. Benedict A. Kammann talk on "The Living Catechism," while teachers of grades 5-8 will hear Sister M. Dominic, Nazareth College, speak on "The School Library and the Improvement of Reading."

Group Meetings Set: After Dr. Mahoney's talks on Social Sciences, the high school program schedules sectional meetings. At 11 o'clock, there will be group meetings of teachers in English, Science, Latin and Business. Sister M. Antonia, Chairman of the English group, announces the Rev. Benedict J. Kammann will be the speaker and his topic is "Catholicizing the Adolescent." The Rev.

Promises To Stop Anti-Catholic Books

NEW YORK.—The Haldeman-Julius Publishing Company, of Girard, Kans., will discontinue publication and advertising of anti-Catholic booklets, according to a letter from the president of the publishing house which has reached Dr. Everett R. Clinchy, President of the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

The promise was in response to a request from Dr. Clinchy urging the publishing house to discontinue anti-religious and anti-Catholic booklets because of "the consequences in a war time like this, of intolerance, hate, suspicion, disunity, developing from these pamphlets."

Dr. Clinchy's request was made after the matter was brought to the attention of the National Conference of Christians and Jews by the Press Relations Committee of the United Catholic Organization, which has its headquarters here.

Spain Marks St. James Feast

MADRID (Delayed).—All Spain celebrated with great solemnity the Feast of its Patron, St. James the Apostle. The most important ceremony was at Compostela in the little town of the Apostle. The liturgy for the Mass on this Feast dates from the year 1100. General Luis Salas Llanos, Captain General of the Eighth Region, accompanied by the municipal authorities, performed the traditional custom of presenting the silver offering to the Holy Trinity from the Chest of St. James. The gift was received by the Most Rev. Tomas Maria Fabra, Archbishop of Compostela, who opened the centuries-old history of Spain's devotion to " Santiago" and pilgrimages from all over Christian Europe to his tomb at Compostela.
