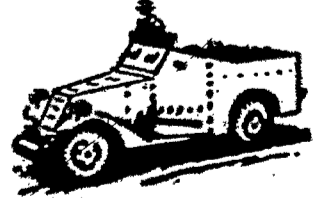
### RELICS PLACED IN ALTAR OF NEW FRIBOURG CHURCH

GENEVA - The remains of St. Peter Canisius, Protector of Fribourg and Doctor of the Church, have been transferred to the renovated and newly-consecrated main altar of St. Michael's, the Church of the Jesuit College at Fribourg. The relics were placed in a new urn designed by the artist Marcel Feuillat. A relic of St. Nicholas of Flue, sent for this purpose from Sachseln, has been placed in the lateral chapel which previously served as the tomb of St. Peter Canisius.

GENEVA - John E. Captain O'Malley served overseas in the United States Army during the first World War and was a member of the 381st Infantry, 96th Division Reserves until 1940 when his commission expired.

Captain O'Malley applied for a commission in the Armed Forces in the present war on Dec. 8. He has been active in the civic and military circles in the community and is affiliated with several local clubs and organizations.
