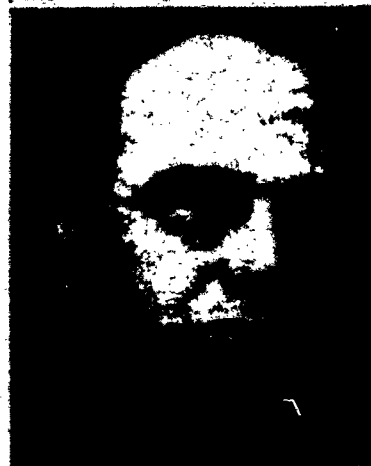
Tuesday Nite Parties Begin

No. 176—Bishop Wiling

Most Rev. Joseph C. Wiling, Bishop of Pueblo, Horn, Duquesne, Sept. 6, 1884. Ordained, June 20, 1906, at Duquesne. On faculty, Mt. St. Charles College (Carroll College), Helena, Mont. Secretary to Bishop Carroll, 1913-16. Chancellor, Diocese of Helena, 1916-29. Pastoral work, Cathedral parish, Helena; Immaculate Conception Church, Butte. Named a Papal Chamberlain, 1921; Domestic Prelate, 1940. Vicar General, Diocese of Helena, 1939. Named first Bishop of Pueblo, Colo., Dec. 9, 1941. Consecrated by Papal Delegate, at Helena, Feb. 26, 1942. Installed, Mar. 12, 1942. (N.C.W.C.)

ENGLISH BISHOPS ATTEMPT TO SOLVE SCHOOL PROBLEM

LONDON—The Hierarchy of England and Wales has submitted to the Government two plans which would meet Catholic claims in the education question. It was disclosed by the Bishop of Leeds, the Most Rev. H. Poakitt, at a special conference of the Catholic Teachers' Association, held in Leeds.
 Bishop Poakitt did not indicate the nature of the proposals submitted to the government beyond saying that they are "based on the definite line of the principles governing education which were laid down by the Bishops in 1929."
 The 1929 declaration of principles affirmed that it is no part of the normal function of the State to teach, and insisted that the teacher is always acting in loco parentis and never in loco civitatis.

Dignity of Christian Womanhood Is Topic

CARACAS—(NC)—"Through Christ and for Christ in Defense of Womanhood" was the theme of the Catholic Action Week just held here. In all the parishes of the Archdiocese Catholic young women assembled to study and confer on the dignity of Christian womanhood, and to forestall current propaganda which menaces the Sacrament of Marriage and would "pervert the glorious Catholic tradition of the people of Venezuela."

Polish 'Black Book' To Give Details of Nazi Persecution

LONDON—(NC)—Details of the persecution of religion by the Nazis invaders of Poland are to be presented in the "Black Book of P-

1942, soon to be published, it is announced by KAT, Polish Center for Foreign Agency.
 The "Black Book" is a massive, detailed record of the persecution of the Catholic Church in Poland during the Nazi occupation. It contains nearly 100 pages of accounts of the suffering, the destruction of churches, and the persecution of the clergy and faithful. The book is being published in English and Polish.

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
