Aviator Whose Medal Saved Him In Pacific Returns To Auburn Home

AUBURN — Lieutenant Clarence E. Sanford, the young man who became world famous because he miraculously escaped death when the Aborigines discovered a miraculous medal attached to a chain which he wore about his neck, is back in Auburn to enjoy a month's furlough.

Despite the difficulties which Sanford encountered since he last saw his native city, he looks in perfect condition and is anxious to get back to get a few more cracks at the Japs.

He did not tell where his group was stationed or from what port he sailed or from what country he had embarked but merely said "I came

from the southwest Pacific." Sanford is convinced however that the United Nations in the southwest Pacific battle area are going places and doing things at the present time but he added, "No one should get the idea that the Japs are pushovers. They're tough. They're professional fiends. There isn't an amateur in the bunch and their planes are of the best. We've a real job ahead, but from now on it will be the Japs who are taking it."

Lost in Sky

On March 31, 1942, Sanford and three other pilots were ordered to intercept a Jap formation heading toward the Allies. Sanford said "we got seven of the nine Zeros and two of the eight bombers which we met." He sent two Jap planes into the sea and then another Jap got onto his tail and rained machine bullets against the armor plate of his plane. A bullet must have gone into his hydraulic system because his wheels went down. So he headed into the clouds and when he emerged he was lost. He flew south hoping to see land. His companions all found their way through. Suddenly his engine began to sputter and in a few minutes he had to bail out. His plane went down like a rock. He floated into the sea three miles from some unknown island. There was a bullet burn across his foot so he kicked off his shoes and prepared for the long three mile swim. As he started out he saw a shark and

Charles J. Mahoney, Ph.D., Associate Superintendent of Schools, for the high school grades.

Higher Grades Meeting

At 12:00 P. M. while the teachers of the first six grades are at lunch, Miss Regina Kennedy, Principal of School No. 28, will speak to 7th and 8th grade teachers on "Speech and General Education." She will also talk at 1:00 P. M. on "Speech and the Three R's," for grades 4-6. Miss Monica Servas, B.S., will speak to the primary grade teachers on "Laying Musical Foundation in the Primary Grades," at 1:30 P. M. while the teachers of the six upper grades are lunching.

At 2:00 P. M. teachers of grades 1-4 will hear Rev. Benedict A. Ehmman talk on "The Living Catechism," while teachers of grades 5-8 will hear Sister M. Dominic, Nazareth College, speak on "The School Library and the Improvement of Reading."

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Promises To Stop Anti-Catholic Books

NEW YORK — The Haldeman-Julius Publishing Company, of Girard, Kans., will discontinue publication and advertising of anti-Catholic booklets, according to a letter from the president of the publishing house which has reached Dr. Everett E. Clinchy, President of the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

The promise was in response to a request from Dr. Clinchy urging the publishing house to discontinue anti-religious and anti-Catholic booklets because of "the consequences in a war time like this, of intolerance, hate, suspicion, disunity, developing from these pamphlets."

Dr. Clinchy's request was made after the matter was brought to the attention of the National Conference of Christians and Jews by the Press Relations Committee of the United Catholic Organizations, which has its headquarters here.

Spain Marks St. James Feast

MADRID (Delayed)—All Spain celebrated with great solemnity the Feast of St. James, the Apostle. The most important ceremony was at Compostela beside the tomb of the Apostle. The liturgy for the Mass on this Feast dates from the year 1100.

General Luis Salas, Captain-General of the Basque Region, accompanied by the municipal authorities, performed the traditional custom of presenting the silver offering to the treasury from the Chief of State. The gift was received by the Most Rev. Tomas Muniz Pablos, Archbishop of Compostela, who recalled the centuries-old history of Spain's devotion to "Saints" and pilgrimages from all over Christian Europe to the tomb of the Apostle.
