

### 'Ad' in Secular Paper Carries Archbishops Views On Education

NEW ORLEANS.—"Every child has a God-given right to education; parents have the corresponding duty, for which they are accountable to God, to educate their children with a view to destiny in time and eternity," the Most Rev. Joseph P. Rummel, Archbishop of New Orleans, said in a full page display advertisement in the school supplement published by the Times-Picayune. Under the heading, "Education for God and Country," His Excellency continued in his signed article:

"The general aims of education are to store the mind and memory with useful knowledge, to train and discipline the will according to immutable principles and standards of right living, to make the child aware of his relationship and duty to self, to his fellow men, to society, to country and to God, lastly to prepare him for a life of usefulness and fruitfulness.

"The full content of education must include knowledge of God and His attributes, of the soul with its immortal life and eternal destiny of the moral law with its accountability to the Divine Judge. To offer less is a real privation for the child a detriment to society and blow at the structure of genuine civilization and culture.

"Patriotism, especially in a democracy cannot survive without education, but this in turn will prove futile and possibly even harmful if it is not buttressed by the spinal and moral strength of religion. Therefore, the Catholic way of life teams religion with education and makes for God and Country the twin aims of the independent system of education which the Church maintains and fosters.

"Catholic parents may this serve as a reminder of the blessed heritage that you have in your Catholic schools a reminder of your duty in conscience to send your children to the Catholic school—grade, high, college and university. Give them the type of education that will train them to be better citizens by being better Christians, patriotic Christians who will give their all for God and Country."

On the page are listed the 52 parochial elementary schools and the ten parochial high schools in the city of New Orleans.

Already over 30 pastors have announced intention of participating. The Novena, starting Sept. 11, and continuing until the Feast of Our Mother of Sorrows, Sept. 20, is unique in that Novenites are asked not to make private intentions for themselves, but to make the Novena in the name of a brother or sister in Christ some place in the world, whom Our Sorrowful Mother judges needs it most.

At the National Novena Shrine, the schedule of remembrances includes: China, Thailand, Belgium, Poland, Greece, France, the Slav countries, Lithuania, Holland, Norway, Philippines, New Guinea, Borneo, Java, Victims of war in the United States.

### AUSTRIAN WIDOWMAID HEADS NEW CONGREGATION OF WOMEN IN BRAZIL

SAO PAULO, Brazil.—An Austrian widow, Mrs. Superior of a new congregation for women, just founded by Dom Pedro Benoit, Abbot of the Benedictine Abbey of Jandua, State of Sao Paulo.

The new congregation, which is called the **Order of the Holy Ursula**, will undertake missionary work in rural areas, which lack large numbers of priests and social industrial centers. These places are at such great distances that priests can visit them infrequently.

The Order of St. Ursula is to operate in a particular place assigned in Brazil and remain there for a month, ministering to the spiritual and even physical needs of the people, instructing the children, and generally preparing them for the priest against the day of his coming.

After a month they spend in a distant rural place, the Order returns to their headquarters for a short stay during which they receive new physical and spiritual strength.
