124 Women On Retreat At St. Bonaventure's

ST BONAVENTURE — One hundred twenty-four women from 25 cities in New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey attended the fourth annual retreat held at St. Elizabeth's Academy, St. Bonaventure, N. Y., last weekend. This was the largest group ever to make the retreat for women in the Franciscan Institution—twice as many reporting for the retreat as those registering last year.

Many of the women are reported to have made the retreat due to the glowing reports brought back by their husbands, fathers, brothers and sons who made the retreat at St. Bonaventure College the previous week. Rev. Garrase McMullen, O.F.M., was Director of both Retreats, and Fr. Isadore O'Brien, O.F.M., delivered the convocation speeches to both groups.

The Sisters of St. Francis, under the supervision of Rev. Mother Jean Marie, O.S.F., Superior of St. Elizabeth's, were in charge of arrangements for the women.

Reports from the women in attendance indicated great enthusiasm over the Conference speeches, and the hospitality of the Franciscan Sisters. Noteworthy among the activities at the Retreat were the outdoor Stations of the Cross, which were conducted on the St. Elizabeth campus, and the recitation of the Rosary in the beautiful Grotto which was built in 1926 in honor of Rev. Mother Teresa, O.S.F. Approximately 15 of the women immediately submitted reservations for next year's Retreat.

As in the men's Retreat, the highlight of the services was the conclusion of the Retreat on Sunday with a Holy Hour for the men in the service. The nuns of these men were placed on the Holy Altar by relatives during the retreat and remained there during Mass and Benediction on Sunday. The Retreat closed with the singing of "Holy God" and "The Star-Spangled Banner."

Eight of the retreatants remained at St. Elizabeth's until Monday morning, when two were received into the Third Order of St. Francis in the Parish Church.

The day grew dark and colder Jerusalem was lost They never noticed the wound on His shoulder

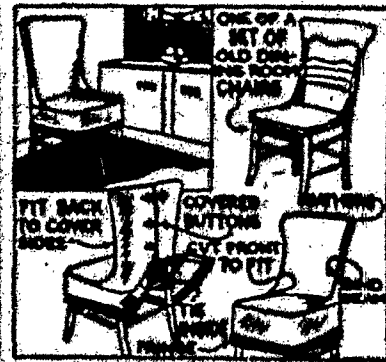
Cut to the bone by the weight of the cross

ON THE HOME FRONT with RUTH WYETH SPARR. Modernize Your Dining Room. Any dining room may be made fresh and smart with built-in cupboards, a little paint and inexpensive curtains. But what may be done to bring a set of outmoded chairs up-to-date? The one



sketched at the upper right is typical of many that are substantial and sturdy though scarred by long use. All they need is an up-to-date frock to make them perfectly at home in a modern dining room.

If your chairs do not have the supports shown at the sides of the seat they will be easier to slip-cover. This cover is of medium blue cotton ray with darker blue for the bias binding and the cotton fringe around the bottom. Large button moulds are covered with the slip cover material for the button-up-the-back opening. If you are not expert at making bound buttonholes, snaps may be used under the buttons. The narrow strap sewn to the corners of the inside of the seat cover hold it neatly in place.
