### Verein Conventions Lauded By Rochester Delegates

Reports of the delegates to the State and National conventions of the Catholic Central Verein of America and the National Catholic Women's Union were given at a joint meeting of the Rochester Branches of the two organizations held last Sunday afternoon in St. Joseph's Hall. The State convention was held in Buffalo over Labor Day, and the National convention in St. Louis, Mo., August 22-26.

Rev. Dr. Joseph H. Geffel told of the deep impression the convention speakers and proceedings held at St. Louis made upon him. He stated that it was evident that the Central Verein is aware of the conditions which brought about the Nazi regime in Germany and is doing all in its power to prevent those conditions from growing in this country. Chief among these, it was brought out, is the indifference of the people in the workings of their government. He complimented those present on being a group doing its utmost to become acquainted with the problems of the day and urged them to continue to learn and make known sound social doctrine.

**Like Spiritual Retreat**  
Former County Judge Philip E. Donnelly, William J. Fuehrer and Laura K. Schilling, delegates to the St. Louis convention, all spoke of the deep spiritual tone of the convention. Miss Schilling stated that it partook of the nature of a spiritual retreat. Judge Donnelly gave some interesting sidelights on the work of the Central Bureau and the efforts being made to keep it functioning despite financial difficulties. Mr. Fuehrer said that the talk of Bishop O'Hara of Kansas City delivered at the Mass which opened the St. Louis convention was in his mind the outstanding event.

Mrs. Loretta Ritzenthaler, Mrs. Madge Spiegel and Mrs. Phillip H. Donnelly gave reports of the convention of the National Catholic Women's Union held at Buffalo. They told of the impressive religious services of the Exposition exhibit, the speeches of the delegates

in their deliberations and the splendid hospitality of Father Landwehr and the Buffalo committee.

The proceedings of the Buffalo convention of the Central Verein were reported by Joseph H. Gervais, Oliver Wacostax, Charles H. Mura, William Wittman, August M. Maier and William Pascher. The delegates were particularly impressed by the excellence of the Resolutions Committee and the resolutions submitted to the convention. The resolutions centered around the nation's war effort and brought to bear on the problems created by present conditions the social teachings of the church.

In concluding his remarks Mr. Gervais stated that after seeing the fine type of men, particularly younger men, in attendance at Buffalo, he was certain the New York State Branch would not lack leadership for many years to come.

Judge Donnelly called the attention of the meeting to the concluding statement of the Inter-American Seminar on Social Studies drawn up at Washington, D. C. on September 15. He referred to it as a blue print for the post-war world, and urged all members to read it carefully.
