The names of Hanna, Hartley, Meehan, Curran, Nelligan, Hickey, Wirth, Petter, Gefell, Boppel, are among those on the carly list of its graduates. St. Andrew's Seminary was the fulfilment of the ambition in the mind of a young Bishop to set up a school to foster vocations to the Priesthood, to give young men from all our families the opportunity to fit themselves to follow their vocation.
