

POPE SENDS \$10,000 FOR RELIEF OF VICTIMS OF GUATEMALA EARTHQUAKE

GUATEMALA (U. S. C. —) The Holy See Pope Pius XII sent \$10,000 for the relief of victims of the earthquake that visited the central and western sections of Guatemala last

month, and with it his Apostolic Blessing. The donation was sent to and is being distributed by His Excellency the Most Rev. Giuseppe Belloni, Papal Nuncio. Press and radio have expressed the national gratitude.

A number of churches suffered considerable damage and some towns were wiped out. Even colonial churches, containing valuable works of art, were damaged despite their massive construction.

Monastery Closed

London.—The monastery of the Capuchin Fathers in Midway Street has been closed by the Gestapo. It is stated in news received here by the Polish Catholic Press Agency, KAP. All of the monks have been imprisoned by the German Nazi authorities. It was stated.

safe and later they received a letter from him telling that he was well and that he had been through some very exciting experiences.

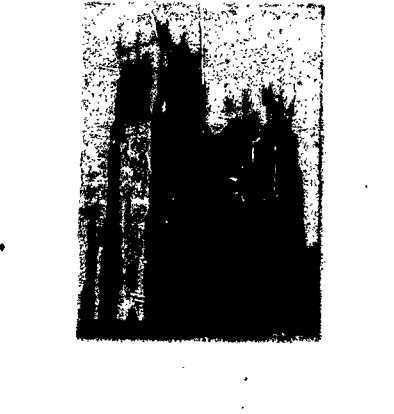

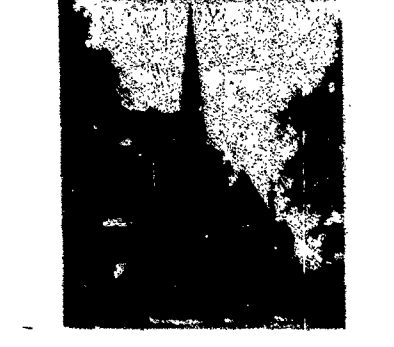

MOURN BOY HERO

WAVERLY Edwin Hiley 12 years old, of Smithboro, was killed almost instantly on Tuesday afternoon, Sept. 15, when struck by an automobile at the Smithboro four corners. Son of Mrs. Goldie Hiley, the boy was on his way home from Tioga Center Central School when the accident occurred.

In January, 1938, Edwin then only eight years old, was cited for heroism when he averted a possible Lehigh Valley railroad train wreck. He discovered that the rails had cracked and immediately notified the station agent, who, in turn, contacted the crew of the fast freight train which was scheduled to pass through the danger area.

The youngster was rushed to the Tioga County General Hospital in the Richards ambulance but was pronounced dead upon arrival. His father was killed in an automobile accident on a hill near Ithaca last November.

Besides his mother, Edwin is survived by five sisters, Dora, Goldie, Joan, Mary and Betty; two brothers, Joseph and Richard, and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hiley of Waverly.

Funeral services were held at the home on Friday morning, Sept. 18, and at St. James' Church in Waverly. Rev. Edward Lyons, pastor of the church, celebrated the Solemn High Mass. Rev. J. E. Keenan was deacon and Rev. Paul McKenzie was sub-deacon. Burial was in the family plot in the St. James' Cemetery.
