

Offer Prayers For Sailor Reported As Missing

GENEVA—Parishioners of St. Francis de Sales and St. Stephen's parishes remembered in their prayers on Sunday, Paul Jennings, First Class Seaman of the United States Navy, who was reported missing in action.

The young man enlisted in the Navy about two years ago and was understood to be somewhere in the Pacific. He visited his home here early in June and his last letter was received the latter part of June. He attended St. Francis de Sales parochial school and De Sales High School and was considerable attention as one of the city's outstanding amateur golfers prior to his enlistment in the Navy.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Patrick F. Jennings of 94 North St., received word on Wednesday, Sept. 16 from the United States Navy Department, stating that their son was missing in action.

Mr. and Mrs. Nicolas Salone of 42 John Street have just received word from their son, Private First Class Frederick Joseph Salone, stating that he is with the United States Marines in Guadalcanal, Solomon Islands.

Private Salone has been in the United States Marines for two years and prior to leaving for foreign duty was at New River, N. C. His letter dated August 26th was received by his parents on Saturday.

Another son of Mr. and Mrs. Salone, Corporal Dominick Salone, of the United States Army is stationed at Fort Benning, Georgia. He was promoted to the rank of Corporal after having been in the Army for only six months.


