Chaplain John V. Loughlin, U.S.N., former professor at St. Bernard's Seminary, and former chaplain of Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus, has acknowledged receipt of a check sent him as a result of a subscription taken up among his fellow-members in Rochester Council.

Writing from Newport News, Father Loughlin states: "The reception of such a sizable check was as unexpected as it was undeserved."

"It is another proof of the cooperation which the Knights of Columbus in general have given in caring for the men in the armed service, and of the generosity of the Rochester Council in particular."

"Under the present set-up of leave, I expect to be due for one in November or December. At that time be assured I shall render my thanks in person."

Children in Diocesan Schools Account For \$50,000 in War Bonds

SAVANNAH, Ga. — Children in parochial schools of the Diocese of Savannah-Atlanta purchased or caused to be purchased \$50,000 worth of war bonds and stamps in the closing months of the last school year, according to the Rt. Rev. Msgr. T. James McNamara, Diocesan Superintendent of Schools.

The program set up in the schools, Monsignor McNamara said, "has a two-fold objective—to teach them democratic processes and to enable them in a very practical way to have part in the Government's war effort. All sorts of means of raising money for the purchase of bonds and stamps are used, such as the collection and sale of paper, clothes' hangers, etc."

Confirmation To Take Place In Newly Decorated Church

LUDLOWVILLE — The Sacrament of Confirmation will be administered, by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney in All Saints' Church in Ludlowville, at 4:45 P. M. on Sunday, Oct. 4.

The Bishop and Rt. Rev. Msgr. William F. Bergen, Chancellor of the diocese; Rt. Rev. Msgr. George V. Burns, Rector of the Pro-Cathedral; Rev. Lawrence H. Casey, Vice-Chancellor and Rev. William Byrne, Pastor of Immaculate Conception Church of Ithaca will be received by Father Albert J. Geiger and the members of the congregation at the door of the church. Fifty-five children and eight adults are to be confirmed at this time.

The occasion will be a happy one for the parishioners of All Saints' Church as the visit of the Bishop coincides with the completion of the work of decorating the interior of the church. The work has been expertly done by Professor Gonippo Raggi, a master of ecclesiastical art, who has won honor and distinction here and abroad, having been honored by the title of Knight of St. Gregory by His Holiness, Pope Pius. Solemn Benediction will conclude the afternoon service to which the people of the community are cordially invited.

The Bishop and his party will take dinner at Our Lady of the Lake Rectory in King Ferry, where he will be joined by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph Cameron, rector of Immaculate Conception Church in Rochester, Very Rev. John Conway, Dean of Auburn, Rev. Patrick Cleary, a Maryknoll Missionary, recently returned from internment in Manchuria, Rev. William Standen, rector of Holy Redeemer Church in Rochester, Rev. John Sullivan, rector of St. John's Church in Rochester and Rev. William Rafferty, pastor in Mt. Me-

ris and a former boy of this parish.

At 7:30 P. M. members and guests of the parish will escort the Bishop and Clergymen to the entrance of the cemetery, where His Excellency will bless the graves and dedicate a Calvary group of stone statuary, which has recently been erected by members of the Rafferty family in honor of their deceased parents.

Confirmation of a class of twenty-five children and four adults will follow immediately in Our Lady of the Lake Church. The people of the community are cordially invited by the Pastor to be in attendance.

Mass will be celebrated at King Ferry and at Ludlowville on Sunday, October 4th at 9 A. M.
