

Recipient of Favor Again Leads Ste. Anne De Beaupre Pilgrimage

STE. ANNE DE BEAUPRE. Que.—Among the many pilgrimages which come to this famous shrine to seek favors that of Andrew J. Ahern, of Springfield, Mass., is particularly significant.

In 1915, Mr. Ahern dislocated his hip in an accident and his left side became paralyzed. The leg remained in a plaster cast for 18 months without improvement. Surgeons of Springfield considered him case incurable.

Hearing of the many favors obtained at Ste. Anne de Beaupre, he joined an annual pilgrimage and arrived at the shrine on July 26, the eve of the feastday. He petitioned the cure in the name of his wife and three children, who seconded him for support.

BENEDICTINES START NEW WORK IN SYRIA

The Benedictine Fathers are carrying on their historic missionary traditions. Centuries ago they brought Christianity to Northern and central Europe. These tireless monks cleared the wilderness, built churches and schools, taught the people. In our own country they have done great work, especially among the Indians.

Ever alert to extend Christ's kingdom, the Benedictine Fathers, at the request of the Sacred Oriental Congregation, have started a house in Beirut, Syria. Already this new mission has made progress and gives every sign of repeating Benedictine success in other lands.

They visit the people living in the hills and out-of-the-way villages, teaching the children, helping the poor and gathering little groups for Mass and prayer. They do not receive even the little support needed for their meagre living.

Right now they are without funds to pay the rent of their small house. They face the threat of having to close up and leave Beirut. That would be a real calamity. We ask our readers to help prevent this. The rent of the house is Forty Dollars a month.

They also need a chapel for their own devotions and where the people can hear the Word of God. Five Hundred Dollars will build the chapel.

Gets Colored Parish


New Orleans.—The Rev. Thomas R. McNamee, S.J., has been named pastor of Our Lady of the Angels, the largest colored parish in the South.

His portrayal of the hermit is from first to last superbly dramatic but true to the authentication fact. It is the spiritual magnificence of a great but humble soul. Of course he at times exaggerates but that is also in "the right of creative freedom." "If you want to attract me as a character," said Dickens when accused of exaggeration, "you must exaggerate the main features." Every audience knows that.

Let me give one example where those who have found fault with the narrative seem to me to have missed the point. "The Lady," who had not yet revealed her identity told Bernadette to drink of the water of the spring and to wash in it. Bernadette saw no spring, but by scraping the earth where she was told, she discovered water. It was muddy. She drank of it from her cupped hands and "washed" her face with it. No nausea or vomiting resulted. These are the facts. Franz Werfel says that unable to find water enough for the double injunction to wash and drink she took a moist lump of earth and smeared her face with it; then took a moist lump and swallowed it. This required "a desperate and nauseating effort" and resulted in vomit. That of course is an exaggeration. It is not correct fact. But as I have said, those who have found fault with it, or have been horrified in reading, miss the point.

SAME MESSAGE

The message of "The Lady" is Bernadette and through her to the people of Lourdes, of France, of the world was "Penitence! Penitence! Penitence!" It was the same message as was given to the world by the Lady's Divine Son 1900 years before: "Unless you do penance you shall all likewise perish." Be penance, get down on your knees, humble yourself, realize your misery, begotten of your sinfulness, confess your sins with face off the earth. That was of course, as horrifying a message to the elite of Paris, as it was to the Pharisees of Judea and Galilee. But if it is the only way back to your Father's home, Franz Werfel, it seems to me, was justified in emphasizing it by a little exaggeration.

Franz Werfel is an artist, poet-novelist. But he is also a scholar which is not true of all poets and novelists. He appears to be well acquainted with the literature of several languages; his general knowledge of Catholic doctrine, of the meaning of Catholic practices is astonishing. I am, therefore, surprised to find this in "The Song of Bernadette": "The people of Lourdes rarely speak French. They speak their own dialect which is akin to Basque."

Basque has no kinship with Languedoc spoken at Lourdes nor indeed with any other language of Europe. I will explain this next week—not to correct Franz Werfel, which would appear preposterous, but because, for reasons which I hope to give, the explanation should have some interest for Catholics.
