

### Christianity, Justice Depend On War Result

LONDON. — "This war is being waged not only for the right to independence of this or that nation but for the future of Christian culture and civilization." Wladislaw Raczkiewicz, President of Poland declared in an address delivered on the third anniversary of the invasion of his native land.

Speaking on the same program, Wladislaw Sikorski, Premier of Poland, said: "Upon the result of the war depends whether the world will be plunged into darkness and slavery or whether the principles of universal justice will reign in it."

Fales in Great Britain began the day of the anniversary by attending Mass for their comrades fallen on the battlefields. The Mass in the Polish Church of St. Stanislaus here was attended by President Raczkiewicz.

### PRIEST IN DIEPPE RAID TELLS HOW MAN ALONGSIDE HIM FELL

LONDON (NC) — Before the Canadians went out on the Dieppe raid they received general absolution from their chaplains, the Rev. Armand Sabourin, who then passed from room to room in a coast town school and gave them Holy Communion.

Father Sabourin went out with the men and came back without a scratch. He calls it a "miracle" and says his boys can't understand it. Reports of his death circulated when several of the men thought they saw him lying on the bullet-riddled beach.

Talking to a Catholic Herald reporter about his feelings as he waited with his men to start the dash for the beach, Father Sabourin said:

"The atmosphere was taut and tense. I seemed all bottled-up inside — anxious that we should move, but doubly anxious that my boys should not move to meet death. Bullets were already splashing about us. We were in the center — bearing the brunt of their fire from right and left among the cliffs as well as from positions ahead.

"Father, Father," a voice called to me from the rear of the boat. I turned and crawled to one of them as he waved a ragged stump of an arm at me.

"At a signal I jumped into the water with a corporal. There was no sense in being cautious. We were fully exposed — moving targets for running fire as we sloped up towards the dry sand. Then the corporal pulled me to my knees in the shallows, shouting 'duck down.' And a bullet thumped into him.

"There were many near squeaks. Bullets formed a wizzing curtain of steel. Somehow I was missed. I saw incredible feats done by unassuming fellows. One had his rifle blown out of his hands, but he went on to his objective. It was

MEXICO CITY. — (NC) — "Retrospective journalism" is suggested by La Nacion, organ of National Action here, to inform persons such as Fidel Velazquez, general secretary of the Mexican Confederation of labor, on the social action of the Church.

In a recent address at a C. T. M. banquet, Velazquez said that in 20 centuries the Church had done nothing "for the exploited or anybody else who suffers and bears burdens."

### FRENCH PEOPLE CONTINUE 'VE MARIANE' CUSTOM

MARSEILLE. — Despite the difficulties of occupation, the custom of the Ve Marianne started in 1930 after the Marian Congress at Boulogne, has been followed.

The venerated image of Notre Dame de Boulogne has been carried in a triumphal carriage to the various cities and towns of the Nord. From Lille the statue was carried to Nancy where 20,000 persons participated in the ceremonies. It also visited Le Puy, Igny and Paray-le-Monial in addition to the usual cities. Along the route, to prevent spontaneous public demonstrations in violation of long-standing civil interdictions, the image of the Blessed Virgin was veiled.
