## Religion Classes

# Sacred Music Correspondence Course Goes Into Many Dioceses

After only three months the Catholic Correspondence Course has registered an imposing list of students for its college accredited course in sacred music study. Twenty-eight religious orders of priests and some represent seven archdioceses, and nine dioceses.

Music consultations throughout the United States are approving the course as a required course of study for those who intend to hold organ positions in the diocese. One of the attractive features of the

course is the opportunity which is still open for charter membership entitling the student to all the future publications of the CCCC which will include the scholarly writings and lessons of such experts as Joseph Beckett, James Parsons organist, and Dr. Eugene Dean of the Montreal University of Music.

The course will culminate with a two weeks' intensive summer session, the first of which will be held at Milwaukee in 1942, to be followed the same summer by courses

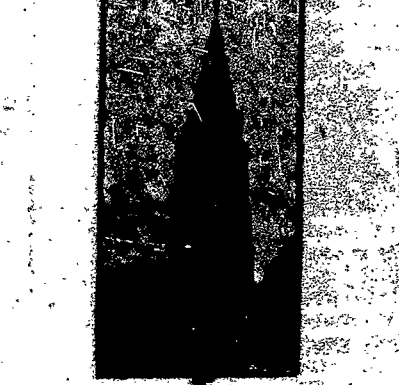
