Her whole ambition was to love God perfectly and to conquer souls for Jesus. At the age of fifteen she entered the Carmelite convent. She died at the age of twenty-four promising to "spread her leaves in being good upon earth." Her Holiness Pope Pius XI declared her Blessed on the 12 of April, 1923 and canonized her on the 17 of March, 1930. Gilbert read in the Mass for the day in Latin: "O Lord who hast said: Unless you become as little children you shall not enter into the King-

dom of heaven: grant unto us, O Lord, that we may be as little children in thy Kingdom and in thy love." The Virgin Mary is our mother and our Queen. Let us pray for her and for all the souls in purgatory.



ROSARY DEVOTIONS

AUBURN — The month of October is replete with feasts of well known saints but the one which has the most appeal to Catholics is that of the Most Holy Rosary which is celebrated on Oct. 7. The name Rosary comes from the Latin word "rosarium" which stands for a garland of roses. The rosary is unique because of the fact that it combines two forms of prayer, vocal and mental. In the recitation of the rosary we make use of the churches favorite prayers while we meditate on the events of Our Lord's life.

The prayers which form the devotion of the rosary are the Credo, the Our Father, the Hail Mary and the Glory be to the Father. The credo is our profession of faith, the Our Father is the prayer which our Lord taught to His disciples when they said "Lord, teach us to pray"; and the Hail Mary is composed of the words addressed to Our Lady by the Angel Gabriel, the words of St. Elizabeth to Our Lady and the words written by Holy Mother Church.

The Rosary is the story of Our Lord's life from the Annunciation to the Coronation of Our Blessed Lady. The meditations are called the Joyful, Sorrowful and Glorious Mysteries with each mystery containing five different points in Our Lord's life. The Joyful Mysteries tell the story of Our Lord's early years. The first meditation is the Annunciation or the announcement by the Angel of Our Lord's coming; the second is the Visitation of Mary to her cousin, Elizabeth. These two mysteries recall the birth of the Holy Mary. The third is the birth of Our Lord; the fourth, the presentation in the temple of the prophecy of Simeon and the fifth recalls Jesus starting his mission on earth when he was found teaching in the temple. The Sorrowful Mysteries picture for us the Passion and death of Our Lord. The Glorious Mysteries recall the crowning events of Our Lord's life. The first is the Resurrection or Our Lord's triumph over death; the second is the Ascension into heaven and the third is the descent of the Holy Ghost upon the apostles. The last two mysteries like the first two, are again dedicated to Mary and indicate Our Lord's love for His mother for in the fourth mystery we meditate on the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin and in the fifth we recall the Coronation of the Blessed Virgin Mary as Queen of Heaven.

Pope Leo XIII was called the Pope of the Rosary. It was he who wrote fourteen encyclicals in commemoration of the great mystery and appointed a proper Mass and office in honor of Our Lady of the Rosary. He also added the title of Queen of the Most Holy Rosary to the Litany. The rosary has long been known as a most powerful weapon of victory for St. Dominic through the intercession of the Rosary converted 100,000 souls.

Friday is the last Friday of October and Masses will be offered at 8, 7 and 6 o'clock. The children of the school will meet at the 8 o'clock Mass and will then be excused for the morning session. They must return for the afternoon classes.
